Ute Mountain teens 'Escape' through filmmaking

"Escape" is a short film written, directed, and produced by teenagers from the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe that focuses on the themes of poverty, substance abuse, and depression.

The 23-minute film was shot in the span of nine days around Towaoc, Colorado and recruited seventeen young filmmakers. Aided by award-winning producer, Alex Munoz, the teens were able to experience a new way of sto-





retelling while expressing the tales of their homeland.

The film's story spotlights on two teenagers who are at against the odds with the world – 14 year old Rachel, played by Makea Clark, and 17 year old Adam, played by Wendell Mills Jr. Rachel lives a troublesome life as she is continually harassed by her classmates, while Adam struggles coming out with his sexual orientation to his alcoholic father. The film is influenced on the strengths of perseverance, pride, and self-acceptance, which the young filmmakers have stated is something they experience themselves.

"We developed a lot of friendships making this," lead actress, Makea Clark said. "We were able to open up our eyes on the situations we all struggle with. We had to team up with everyone on long shoot days, but we got through with it."

Wendell Mills Jr. commented on the supervision of Alex Munoz, who taught the young filmmakers the basic elements of production while keeping true to their vision and voice.

"It was fun doing this film," Mills said. "We couldn't have done it without Alex and his crew from [Los Angeles]."

Munoz and his crew are associated with Films by Youth Inside, a nonprofit organization that empowers young people to improve their lives and become self-reliant through the art of cinema. Program participants learn the basics of screenwriting and filmmaking from industry professionals and utilize those skills to create engaging short films expressive of their own lives.

"They all worked very hard bringing this together, and now it's wonderful they are able to share their own [cinematic] story,"

said Munoz.

Ute Mountain Ute Councilwoman, DeAnne House, congratulated the teenagers on their successes.

"As leaders, it is our duty to think about our membership," House said. "These kids put a lot of effort into this film to express a lot of deep feelings. The movie showed us their courage, honesty, and trust to make something like this possible."

"This movie is important to the teenagers because they have a message to give," Ute Mountain Ute Chairman, Manuel Heart said. "These kids wrote it, directed it, and acted in it themselves. Hopefully we end up bringing a full movie together that involves not just the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe, but also the Northern Ute Tribe and Southern Ute Tribe. I am proud of each and every one of these kids."

Fall health classes begin

The Shining Mountain Health and Wellness Program kicked off its 4-week Fall Diabetes & Wellness Education classes on Wednesday, Oct. 14.

The first class is in the books, and focused on dental health for diabetic patients. Shining Mountain teamed up with Southern Ute Dental Clinic to provide a class on Oral Manifestations of Diabetes.

Southern Ute general dentist Dr. Andrea Talley discussed the effect diabe-

tes has on oral health. "Things happen a lot faster in diabetes patients," Talley said referring to the side effects of poor oral hygiene. Complications associated with diabetes include periodontal diseases – gum disease –, dy mouth, oral thrush and tooth loss, to name a few.

One third of people with diabetes have periodontal gum disease, Talley said. Talley provided tips on how to maintain good oral health: keeping a healthy blood sugar level, brushing twice a day, flossing once twice and year, and main-

aining a healthy lifestyle – while avoiding sugary foods and drinks. "Oral infections thrive on sugar," she said. Talley also encourages patients use soft-bristle toothbrushes: medium to hard bristled brushes can cause gum recession, she said. Talley also recommends switching out your toothbrush as soon as you notice the bristles fraying.

The next class will be held Wednesday, Oct. 21 at the SunUte Community Center from 11:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. and will focus on 'Mind, Body & Soul'.



community Arts Center, Hope Community Christian Academy, Ignacio Community Church, La Plata County Independent Youth Performing Arts, Silver SPRUCE Academy, and SUCAP Youth Services.

“They have all been good neighbors in the community, now they’re all roommates,” Dunton said.

All the tenants are unique in the services they provide, but they all share a common goal – to assist the community, he said.

“It’s neat to see how everyone is working together ... there was a lot of trust knowing that they’re much bigger than one organization,” he said.

Another important part of the deal for the tenants moving in was they provide services to K-12

grades students, he said.


Each tenant has a number of classrooms set aside for their organization, but lines are being crossed – willingly – and in a good way Dunton said.

“There is a lot of sharing space now ... they all have good working relationships,” he said.

The annual Four Corners Storytelling Festival made its return to Berg Park in Farmington, NM as it celebrated its fifteenth year. The festival was hosted on Friday, Oct. 9 and Saturday, Oct. 10, gathering students from schools across the Four Corners region to indulge in the philosophical tales from five storytellers – Joe Hayes, Len Cabral, Dovie Thomason, Susan O'Halloran, and Sid Hausman.

The Southern Ute Indian Montessori Academy was among the attending schools that spent their afternoon listening to a medley of stories about courage, friendship, and pride. "It's good that the kids

can come out and hear these different stories," Academy Lower Elementary Guide, Crystal Ivey said. "They can learn a lot from these."

One of the featured artists was Dovie Thomason, a narrative storyteller who spoke about the tales in relation to her Lakota and Ki-

owa Apache heritage. She stated that her stories are inspired from her own life living as a native.

"I've been storytelling for five years, all of my life stories have been there," she said. "As natives, we are seen as invisible to the popular culture. We tell people stories that matter, and I like to use that as a traditional way of providing native education. Whatever our stories themes are, they are timeless. I want people to see the core of humanity in themselves, so that way we are seen more humanly than stereotypically."

Susan O'Halloran, who focuses her stories on family, conveyed a fascinating tale about a pregnant mother who feared her baby would turn out mean like her husband. She said to her young audience, "Don't let anyone come between you. Make sure you are able to be one with other people – find your sense of place."

Len Cabral, an internationally acclaimed storyteller thrilled the audience with his enthusiastic voices and energy. He told fable stories related to animals from across the world.

"Be one with nature, and always appreciate the beauties around you," he said. "I say that, because all of us are beautiful too."

Spikers merge onto rough road

When high-profile Hunter Gentry became a friendly-fire casualty – popped in the back of her melon by teammate Emma Copp's service bullet – the opposing Ignacio Volleys certainly could have hoped her loss would affect Ridgway the same as their own recent subtraction.

"We were like, 'Oh my gosh, she just got hit in the head!'" IHS senior Chrystianne Valdez said. "We've concussed our own team before, so we know how that is! Yeah, that's happened ... a couple of times in the past."

"We made sure to stay calm," RHS' Ara Norwood said. "That was our key – not let our energy go down."

And unfortunately for Ignacio the Lady Demons didn't. Able to effectively reinforce their weakened front, complementing unsilenced guns Kaitlyn Rutherford and Saren Robinson, the enemy exited the conflict avengers of an earlier defeat which in turn upped the stakes of the Oct. 10 engagement inside IHS Gymnasium.

"We knew we had to just go with it," Robinson said, of Gentry's precautionary removal late in Game 2 of Ridgway's 25-21, 28-26, 25-16 sweep. "We got another girl out on the court – Sammie (Medina) – and we knew she could handle it. She came through for us and helped us out a lot."

"And we just played a lot better amongst everything. Last game we did have our difficulties," she

continued, recalling the Volleys' five-game win up in Ouray County, "but this game we definitely battled against them and came out on top."

"They definitely came in focused, just like we did. You know, this was a big game for both of us ... to determine the league champions, and it did today," said Valdez (23 digs), aware that the Lady Demons had taken a 5-3 lead in games won during the 2A-level teams' head-to-head split of their season series.

Ready to recover from a draining five-game (25-27, 25-20, 20-25, 25-22, 10-15) loss not even 48 hours earlier to visiting 3A La Jara Centauri, Ignacio were the unquestioned aggressors early on in Game 1 with RHS, sprinting out to a 6-1 lead behind the serving of junior Alex Forsythe – again filling concussion victim Shoshone Thompson's setter role – and the hitting of seniors Miel Diaz (5 kills, 12 digs) and Ellie Seibel (4k, 5d).

Not until Rutherford, slow out of the gate, fired consecutive aces to tie at 7-7 did Ridgway show they

were at last ready to rumble with the Red & White, and the Lady Demons – after five more scoreboard ties – took the lead for good at 18-17 and bedded the issue with a Robinson ace.

Game 2 was the one IHS (9-4, 6-1 2A/1A San Juan Basin League) would have wanted back when all was said and done; after building up a solid 12-5 pad again behind Forsythe's initial serving and late kills by junior Sheigh Pollock and sophomore Avionne Gomez, the Cats incredibly suffered quite the collapse.

A Norwood ace pulled the Lady Demons back to as close as 19-18 before Ignacio re-separated and went up 23-20 on Copp's unplanned KO of Gentry, who was denied later re-entry as a precaution. Still, RHS (12-1, 10-1) kept working and at last drew level at 23 on a Brynne Skalla spike off Kelly Campbell.

Rutherford (17k on .393 hitting, 12d) then landed a tip, but after hitting errors by Skalla and Robinson (8k at .400, 11d) gave IHS a

Pirates commandeer IHS' Senior Night

Three away dates now await 'Cats

Scoring defense improved somewhat over the previous week's Homecoming debacle.

And offensively on Friday, Oct. 9, IHS head coach Ponch Garcia not only surprised visiting Monte Vista but also the officiating crew with the same appearance and swift pace of the Bobcats' strange "Polecat" package which earlier this fall had unexpectedly put non-conference powerhouse Paonia on tilt.

To locals in IHS Field's bleachers who'd been unable to travel up to Delta County, the swinging gate-style setup may not have appeared to be the ideal way to attack the No. 5-ranked [CHSAANow.com Class 1A poll, 10/5] Pirates. But like those who'd witnessed the Eagles' struggles with slowing the scheme's quick runs and quicker passes out of its lopsided look, they had to applaud when the visitors regularly receded towards their own goal line.

But as during Homecoming Week versus Walsenburg John Mall, the Cats were unfortunately unable to cross it and MVHS followed the Panthers' 60-0 rout by blanking Ignacio on its Senior Appreciation Night, 41-zero.

But despite recording five takeaways – four after halftime, when Monte Vista's slow-cooked lead, 20-0, was still approachable – and forcing IHS junior Lorenzo Pena to punt the pigskin away as many times, the Pirates (5-1, 2-0 1A Southern Peaks) never looked their usual collective self until senior Presley Garcia got the scoring underway with a two-yard run, capping an 11-play, 64-yard surge with only 1:04 left in the first quarter.

Pena punted after the Bobcats (0-6, 0-2) went three-and-out, but MVHS was in business at the IHS 39-yard line with 11:23 left in the second. Five run plays and just 2:08 later, se-

nior Michael Valdez bulled into the end zone from five yards and freshman Parker Randolph tacked on the first of five point-after kicks to up the ante to 13-0.

Unshaken, Ignacio went back to work and came as close to a touchdown as the Monte Vista 13 on a fourth-down, 16-yard throw from senior quarterback Zach Weinreich (who'd found junior Stocker Robbins for 47 earlier in the drive) to classmate Austin McCaw. But the connection didn't move the sideline chains, and the Pirates retook possession with 6:25 left before intermission.

Including one partially blocked by sophomore Marcus Chapman, the Cats forced two MVHS punts before heading to the locker room, but the guests stepped up their pressure with a 30-yard TD keeper by QB/P Keshawn Duran 25 seconds after Weinreich was intercepted at the MV 48 with only 0:34 remaining.

Knowing his side would be receiving the third-quarter kickoff, Duran mimicked the pot-stirring motion – a silent "something's cooking, uh-oh" to a foe – frequently seen in NBA star James Harden's celebrations as he trotted back to the Pirates' bench, and Monte Vista put the game out of reach after beginning the second half at their 38.

And did so exactly as they'd posted the night's first points – with a lengthy 12-play, 62-yard march

(sustained by a 15-yard roughing-the-passer penalty, but nearly sunk by two offensive infractions), sapping a demoralizing 6:26 off the clock, and producing a 14-yard Presley Garcia TD carry and Randolph PAT.

Pena's outstanding kickoff return subsequently positioned the Bobcats at the MV 33 with 5:18 left in the quarter, but six ticks later the Pirates' offense was back in gear after Valdez picked off Weinreich and ran it back to the MV 45, protecting what was then a four-score advantage.

Duran soon increased the lead to a decisive six scores – enacting the mercy-rule running clock – with a nine-yard return of a Pena fumble (Randolph booted the extra point) with an insulting 0:01.1 still left in the third.

Weinreich unofficially finished 7-of-19 passing for 122 yards in the loss to Monte Vista, with Robbins' 47 yards the individual receiving high. Juanito Medina caught two balls for 38 yards and McCaw two for 19. Pena gained 40 yards rushing on just six attempts, but senior Tyler Beebe's 3-0 and Weinreich's 9-(minus-2) figures were as close to additional ground support as could be mustered.

Up next, IHS' regular season ends with three consecutive road games, starting Oct. 16 in La Jara against Centauri (3-3, 2-0) and continuing 10/23 at Center and 10/30 at Dolores.

A Seibel cross-court kill knotted the score for the last time at 13-13, and after RHS skipper Amy Rutherford took a timeout the guests didn't waver.

"Once we ... found our rhythm again," Robinson said. "We knew we had to fight hard for what we wanted, and that's exactly

what we did. We ... decided to have fun, rather than really just worry about it."

A Pollock block got the Cats as close as 18-15, but kills by Kaitlyn Rutherford and Skalla began what became a clinching 6-0 burst. Copp had the misfortune of giving IHS one last hope with a faulty serve on match point, but Skalla dashed that with a spike resulting in a disputed lift call against Forsythe (8 assists, 4 digs).

"This season was more of a mental game, so it was a good way for the girls to learn mental toughness, and I think that's what we are lacking. I will be focusing on mental toughness a lot more. All teams should understand that any team could be beaten at any given day. But I'm proud of the girls for all they've done."

According to C-team coach Shasta Pontine, the ending of the season is bittersweet.

"It was a hard working season, but the team learned

DEAR TRIBAL MEMBERSHIP AND ALL READERS

My name is Trae Seibel and I am writing this letter to simply speak about one of the most important concepts from an educated standpoint, which is Emotional Intelligence.

Since I was a child, growing up on the reservation, I have been immersed into an environment where I have viewed our own people be victim's of their own reality, including myself. Everyday we experience moments of

When I attended Fort Lewis College School of Business at the age of 21, I was able to experience one of the most powerful courses in my educative career, Management and Organizational Behavior. The first step is to simply be ACCOUNTABLE for all that you, as an individual, have experienced! We are living in a very important time period that we can no longer live in situations where we are continuing to blame others for our unhappiness. Everything that comes before our eyes is a mere reflection of what we have created within our own minds!

Now is the time to challenge yourself and your peers to be a self-managing and self-aware person.

When we can all be at a high level, of not only education, but of emotional intelligence, we will start to see a more positive environment within our own minds and before our own eyes.

I say all of this in a good way, and I hope that we can now WAKE UP and live in harmony. Togoiaák!



Halloween Safety Tips

Everything you need to know to keep your kids safe on Halloween.

WALK SAFELY

- Cross the street at corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks.
- Look left, right and left again when crossing and keep looking as you cross.
- Always walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible.
- Watch for cars that are turning or backing up. Teach children to never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.

TRICK OR TREAT WITH AN ADULT

- Children under the age of 12 should not be alone at night without adult supervision. If kids are mature enough to be out without supervision, remind them to stick to familiar areas that are well lit and trick-or-treat in groups.



FLY-FISHING

New England, more than just colors

Not long ago, she who must be obeyed (swmbo) pointed out that our annual spring road trip had not been taken for several years. When I responded that I was tired of driving, two airplane tickets to New England (N.E.) appeared. I was reminded I hadn't caught fish on my fly rod in six of the N.E. states, and early fall was a good time to do that. In addition to fishing that part of the country I was told we could spend some time seeing N.E. So, I found myself seeing and fly-fishing: Rhode Island, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Vermont, New York, and New Hampshire.

I hadn't spent much time in N.E. So, once there I did notice differences and similarities between them and us. N.E. has lots of people squished into a really small land mass. They have humidity and narrow roads that wander around in seemingly endless circles. So much so, that our GPS finally asked us if we had any idea where we were. N.E. is also the headquarters for Dunkin-Doughnuts, Ben and Jerry's Ice Cream, and the mother ship of fly-fishing, Orvis.

Durango has big pickup trucks with big dogs in the back of them. We also have thinner air and lots of wide-open spaces. If I drove for two hours north or east from Durango, I would still be in Colorado. If I drove two hours north and west



from Rhode Island I'd cross the boundary's of five other states. Which means, I could have based myself in one of the six states and fished everything in two days.

I started the outing in Rhode Island. Similar to many of the N.E. states, I had the opportunity to fish either salt or fresh water. I chose salt water and managed to catch blue fish. For those of you not familiar with blue fish, they are mean, very aggressive, and have big teeth. Don't put your fingers around their mouth; you might lose them. Massachusetts was knocked off the list on the way to Connecticut, total drive of about three hours. Everything is so close together. Anyway, we stopped at a park and I fished its lake, all on my own. I was told in the parking lot that the fishing wasn't very good. I think it was someone not wanting a foreigner fishing his waters. I didn't take his word for the fishing and proceeded to catch some nice sized pan fish.

Connecticut found us in a fishing lodge on the Farm-

ington River (it's not part of New Mexico). Here was my first lesson in skittish trout. So skittish, that I learned to wait for several minutes before re-casting to a missed fish. Of course, if I hadn't missed it in the first place I wouldn't have had to let it rest. I also received a lesson in the European method of nymphing. It did produce several trout.

On to Vermont and New York. Even taking all the back and scenic roads, it only took a couple hours of driving. Vermont and New York yielded trout, bass, and panfish. The weather was hot, and the streams in both states very low, so I fly-fished only in the mornings. The streams flowed through farmland and passed old industrial buildings that are being recycled into modern businesses. In fact, the largest trout I caught was next to an old plant that is now a microbrewery.

The road trip ended in New Hampshire. The first part of the morning had me floating on a pond, think On Golden Pond, in a canoe. I love fly-fishing from canoes. Except for the trout, and the loons chasing them, my guide and I were the only occupants on the pond. The brook trout rose to, and took, my dry flies. The afternoon had me on a really small stream, high sticking a small caddis for more brook trout.

New England and Colorado are certainly different. However, what they do share is the common language of fly-fishing. Head there next fall and see if you don't agree.




