For five days and late nights, the largest tournament tree likely ever seen in town was propped up outside the Sky Ute Casino Resort Events Center's inner doors.

As each of the 64 competitors began what each hoped would be a successful climb to the bracket's top, fans from far and wide had the chance to witness their talents as the oft-distant realm of ESPN suddenly became very domestic. Possibly the spectators' greatest thrill was simply playing the 'name game' and trying to spot all the familiar faces of the sport:

'The Duchess of Doom.' 'The Black Widow.' 'The Irish Invader.' 'The Texas Tornado.' Once inside, virtual silence was golden and players' skills shone even brighter.

That's right, folks. Though the number 64 in the wide world of sports most often provokes thoughts of NCAA 'March Madness' basketball, the Women's Professional Billiard Association, in fact, was the featured attraction in Ignacio from September 16-20. And the 2009

only been a year old, but hopefully it just keeps growing and making money for the Tribe."

"Well we have several friends of the WPBA who are always kind of watching out for us, and know the general manager here, Matt Olin," explained Office Administrator-and former player—Anne Craig.

"And our board members who generally negotiate such things got in touch, one thing led to another, and Sky Ute said, 'Yeah you guys come here!' So this is where we ended up and we love it."

Those attending the event loved it so much, and were so fixated on the players' methods that, by the time the 'Final Four' remained to battle for the title, Tournament Director (and emcee) Steve Tipton had to remind everyone it was still cool to cheer spectacular shots. After all, the Worldwide Leader In Sports had its cameras rolling, so the louder the better...

Express Your Opinions

My Fellow Tribal Members

I am writing because election time is coming up and we need to be responsible voters. I just want to encourage everyone to read the minutes and see who is voting in our best interest and who is speaking out for us.

I also want to give thoughts/ concerns I have to other Tribal Members so they have information when it comes time to vote.

The first is that our leaders should be looking out for our best interest. I am concerned with the spending habits of the Tribal Council. There are some Council Members who are spending like there is not a recession. Too much money is going out, like the Museum and the Detention Center. There is no reason for these buildings to be built RIGHT NOW, especially if they can not stay within their budget! The welfare of the membership should come first, not the job security for the employees.

The country is in a recession and the Council is spending money like it grows on trees! The Council insists it is for the benefit of the membership, but how is an extra \$4 million for the Museum, because they could not stay within their budget a benefit for us? I do not see it. I think a benefit to us would be to put that money into the Emergency

Family Service fund so it would help Tribal Members with paying for heating and food costs during this recession.

The next is that some Council Members are shielding non-Indian employees and allowing them to control the respective Council Members. So, my question to these Council Members is: why do we, Tribal Members, not get the support that the non-Indians get? It seems that some Tribal Members think the non-Indians are smarter than Indians. This idea is not even close to being true and it is an oppression of Indians against Indians.

Another concern I have is how we have non-Indian, other Indians as well as OUR OWN TRIBAL MEMBERS working for the Southern Ute Indian Tribe, but yet we are discriminated against by these employees. You would think that the other Indians would not discriminate, but they do. All the people I am talking about but more restrictions upon the Tribal Membership in order to receive the services that were established for us, Southern Ute Tribal Members. The Council is approving these restrictions upon us and not stepping up and saying no, this is OUR money and these are OUR people, so these restrictions will not work!!! These employees keep Tribal Members out of employment with the Tribe and get their family and friends in these positions. They criticize Tribal Members for their budgeting skills, which is not a matter of the employee. They are rude to all people, yet nothing is done about the bad behavior that is displayed to the Tribal Membership. But, I have noticed that Tribal Members will be fired immediately upon bad behavior. These employees also make comments about the money the Tribal Members get. The money Tribal Members get is not a concern or business of these employees. It is a matter between the Tribe and its Tribal Members.

Another issue about employment is why is the Tribe holding "open" a position for a non-Tribal Member? The Director of Tribal Member Health Benefits should have been filled years ago. It is still under an "Acting" Director. This could explain all the issues that Tribal Members have with this department.

I would like to see the Tribal Council submit, voluntarily, to drug testing that is not scheduled. This would ensure that the decisions that the Council are making are not influenced by drugs or alcohol. And if there is drug use by the Council Members, are the decisions that are being made truly in the best interest of the Membership.

I suggest that the Tribe cut their budget by 20%, without getting rid of all Tribal Members. This would show there is a concern, by the Tribe, about the current economics. But looking at the way Tribal Members are treated right now, I now they would be the first to go. The rationale by the non-Indians of laying off Tribal Members is because they receive the money they do from the Tribe. For some reason, people think that it is a lot of money, which it really is not after paying the taxes that we do.

Another suggestion is that all the departments and programs be evaluated to improve services to Tribal Members and eliminate the ones that are outdated and do not provide quality services. It is time to be smart and abolish programs that no longer work in the Tribe's scheme.

When reading the minutes, there is one person on Council who is asserting more accountability towards the Tribal Membership by the employees and trying to assert accountability by the Council. I applaud you Barb Scott for your efforts.

I challenge all Tribal Members to get involved and understand all the aspects of the Tribe and become informed of the business transactions of the Tribe. Remember, it is us, Tribal Members, who seat the Council and we should be their first concern not the non-Indians who find ways to take from us. I also hope this has helped give an insight into the decisions of the Tribal Council and how we, Tribal Members, are not a priority.


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NFL Celebrities and Classic Cars In Ignacio





Healthy Perspectives: "Good Health"

Good health is a goal that applies to persons of all backgrounds regardless of age, gender, or ethnic background. We all measure health using our own yardstick. There are almost as many definitions of good health as there are people.

For one, good health means a freedom from pain and suffering while for another it may be a long life. For some, good health is about prevention of disease while for others it is about the treatment of disease once it occurs. For many, good health applies not only to the physical but also to the mental and the spiritual. The concept of health certainly applies to all aspects of the person.

As a doctor, I learned long ago that every patient is a partner in the process of achieving good health. In the partnership, the two persons- patient and doctorare equals. The essence of the relationship is communication and the most important part of this communication is the ability for both to understand the patient's goals for his or her health and to work together to achieve these goals.

Contrary to popular belief,



doctors are not healers. In fact, the word "physician" actually means teacher. The goal of a good physician is to try to understand a patient's goals for their health and then to use the gifts of education he or she has received to give the patient tools in achieving those goals.

The challenge that faces each of us in our daily lives is to match the many decisions we make with the values we hold for our health. It is a difficult challenge since like all struggles for a thing of value, it requires personal sacrifice.

My own personal approach to good physical health begins with prevention- a topic that actually extends to all aspects of health. The topic of prevention has so many different aspects, to which

I have devoted this column for the past 6+ years. Yet there are a few that merit review.

In our western culture, some of the greatest challenges to health are related to the obesity epidemic. These include excess calorie intake in the form of high fat, high sugar content foods. Inactivity plays an important role. A well-balanced diet, weight management, and regular aerobic physical activity greatly reduce the risk of many chronic illnesses.

Smoking continues to be a major lifestyle factor affecting the health of Americans. It is a major risk factor for heart disease, stroke, and certain types of cancer. Tobacco cessation is perhaps the single most important preventive health measure that a smoker can take.

Particularly during this year's flu season, the issue of personal respiratory hygiene is another major factor in preventive health. Hand washing, staying home when you are sick, and covering your mouth and nose when your sneeze or cough can greatly reduce your risk of infectious illness.

My wish for the reader is twofold- that you may know your own definition for good health and that you may possess the tools necessary to achieve it.

As discussed in some of our previous articles, the kidneys are responsible for filtering the blood to make urine, eliminating waste products from the body. Where do these waste products come from?

Some are derived from food. An example is potassium, an electrolyte present in many fruits and other foods. Diets high in potassium are generally healthy for people without kidney disease and are recommended to lower the risk of developing high blood pressure. However, if potassium accumulates in the body, for example due to excessive intake in patients with kidney disease, it can be very dangerous. Healthy kidneys are extremely efficient at removing excess potassium, usually keeping the concentration in the blood very steady.

Protein, another important constituent of a healthy diet, is broken down to various products which can also be dangerous if allowed to accumulate in the blood. Breakdown products of proteins come from our diet or from turnover of the cells from our own bodies. These nitrogen-

to be some of the main culprits causing patients with chronic kidney disease to feel sick. The kidneys also remove many drugs and poisons from our blood.

When they work correctly, the kidneys are astoundingly efficient in removing all of these harmful substances. They filter 150 litres (about 40 gallons) of blood every day to achieve this feat. Not bad for a couple of organs each only the size of your fist!

Unfortunately, kidney disease is all too common; about 1 in 9 adults in the US have chronic kidney disease, decreasing the effectiveness of this toxinremoving system. The most common causes of kidney disease are diabetes and hypertension.

What happens when kidney function starts to decline? containing chemicals are thought Initially, there are typically no

symptoms. A decrease in kidney function down to as low as 30 per cent might allow a person to continue feeling quite well. Many people therefore develop quite severe degrees of kidney disease without realizing it. So it's worth having your kidney function checked if you have any risk factors for kidney disease. We recommend screening for kidney disease in any person with diabetes, high blood pressure or a family history of kidney disease. The screening typically involves

a blood and urine test and measurement of blood pressure. Many other medical conditions raise the risk of kidney disease; your doctor can tell you if you should be screened.

More severe kidney disease can cause many symptoms including weakness, fatigue, nausea, wasting, shortness of breath, itching etc. In the final stages of kidney disease, dialysis or transplantation becomes necessary to preserve life.

Fortunately, if kidney disease is detected early, there are very effective treatments which can slow down the decline in kidney function. It can be difficult to keep taking medicine to prevent a disease which isn't causing any symptoms at the time, but the long-term results of improved kidney function are well worth it.





15th Annual Delta Council Tree Fair PowWow







It doesn't matter if the car you're driving is new or old, big or small. Driving technique and proper vehicle maintenance go a long way toward protecting the environment. By following five simple steps, you can do your part by improving gas mileage, which will also save money at the pump. • Drive Green - How your drive has a lot to do with fuel economy. Avoid sudden starts and stops and go the speed limit. Jerky and aggressive driving decreases your miles per gallon (MPG) and increases wear and tear on your vehicle. Minimize unnecessary miles by combining errands in one trip.

• Get a Tune-Up - Regular tune-ups, maintenance and having

pollute less and burn less gas. With a proper tune-up, you can save four percent on the cost of gas and up to 40 percent by replacing a faulty oxygen sensor. Simply changing the car's air filter can improve efficiency by 10 percent.

• Lighten the Load – Get the junk out of the trunk and the stuff out of your car, with the exception of emergency items such as a spare tire, flares and a first-aid kit. Extra items weigh the vehicle down and cause an increase in gas usage.

• Tire Checks – Around two billion gallons of gas each year could be saved if the tires on every American's car were properly inflated. Optimal tire pressure for your vehicle is listed in the owner's manual. Tires that are not properly inflated add rolling resistance that makes the engine work harder to move the

costs as much as three to five cents per gallon, and increases the risk of engine damage.

• Gas Caps and Fill-Ups -Approximately 17 percent of vehicles on the road have loose, damaged or missing gas caps, causing 147 million gallons of gas to vaporize every year. Topping off your gas tank when filling up your car can also release harmful vapors into the environment.

Vehicle owners who do their own maintenance should remember to recycle or properly dispose of fluids and other vehicle components, including used motor oil, tires and batteries.







In fact, the two finest Asian players-Ga Young Kim of Taiwan (though born in South Korea), and Xiaoting Pan of China-advanced to play on the final stage. Which happened to be a custom Brunswick table valued at nearly \$40 thousand! Joining them were regular crowd favorite Jeanette Lee [that 'Widow'], and Kelly 'Kwikfire' Fisher of England.



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
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
