Ignacio roadwork to begin after Fourth of July weekend

Construction to improve State Highway 172 in Ignacio, Colo., will start Monday, July 7. Improvements to the highway are expected to benefit not only motorists, but pedestrians as well.

The project is slated to be completed mid-October – long before the June 2015 grand opening of the new Growth Fund office building – and will help manage the influx of traffic expected to the area.

According to Kurt Prinslow, Tierra Commercial Project Manager, the highway improvement project is not new; however it is just one of the many elements of the Ignacio Area Access Corridor Plan (IACAP) that is getting implemented. The IACAP created a “blueprint” for how the major corridors in the area will serve traffic for residents, workers, and visitors. The entire plan can be reviewed on the Southern Ute Indian Tribe website at www.southernute-nsn.gov/tribal-planning. The IACAP committee includes representatives from: the Southern Ute Indian Tribe, Ignacio, La Plata County and the Colorado Department of Transportation.

During the three-month project, motorists can expect some delays and detours as crews work to improve the

highway, drains, gutters and sidewalks. Motorists can plan on two road closures during construction: one at Weeminuche Avenue and one at Ouray Drive.

Weeminuche Avenue will be closed between July 28 and August 1, and Ouray Drive will be closed for approximately two weeks from September 1 to September 12, Prinslow said.

Weeminuche Avenue will have a signal installed and Ouray Drive will be transformed into a right-in/right-out only intersection.

“There will be no more left turns into or out of Ouray,” he said.

According to Prinslow, State Highway 172 will not be closed at any time during construction, and access to the current Growth Fund parking lot will not be affected.

Motorists can expect to see work begin in front of Thriftway and span northward to the intersection of State Highway 172 and La Plata County Road 314; where the bulk of the work will take place, Prinslow said.

Pedestrians will soon see the crosswalks in front of Thriftway and the crossing in front of the current Growth Fund building disappear, as a raised concrete median will emerge in the center of State Highway 172 – in front of the new Growth Fund building.

A new crosswalk will be

constructed to pass through the new median. The upgraded crossing will include rapid flash beacons and a pedestrian refuge in the median which will increase pedestrian safety while crossing the street, Prinslow said.

“By moving the old crossing further north, it’s going to be more safe for pedestrians to cross the street; there will be a pedestrian activated warning system and warning flashers that come on to alert traffic,” he said.

Pedestrians will also be able to cross the highway safely at the State Highway 172 and La Plata County Road 314 intersection, which will be equipped with traffic signals and designated crosswalks.

Upon completion, motorists traveling north- and southbound through the State Highway 172 and La Plata County Road 314 intersection will see new traffic signals; left and right dedicated turn lanes; and one through lane.

Eastbound commuters on La Plata County Road 314 can expect to see one shared lane for both left turning- and thru traffic, along with one right turn lane onto southbound State Highway 172.

Westbound traveling traffic on Weeminuche Avenue will have one shared lane for all through movement’s, including left and right turning traffic, Prinslow said.

Tribe updates state officials at CCIA meeting

The second Colorado Commission of Indian Affairs meeting of 2014 was held Friday, June 20 at the Ute Mountain Casino in Towaoc, Colo. Representatives of the Southern Ute and Ute Mountain Tribes met with state officials to discuss updates from the past three months.

Southern Ute Vice Chairman, Mel Baker updated the commission on the signing of House Bill 1080 on the Southern Ute Reservation and the opening of the new dental and optical modular.

“It was a really historic moment for both Ute tribes and we were glad we got to host the governor for the signing,” he said. “Monday, June 2 we had our new dental and optical modular

open, which is allowing the clinic to start renovating the vacated exam rooms in the clinic,” Baker continued. “We have plans of building a whole new medical facility down the road but this is a good step towards that.”

Baker also reported that

in recent work sessions tribal housing has been a topic of discussion.

“We are looking at housing needs for tribal members and tribal employees, he said.” We are working with

Stage I fire restrictions initiated

BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS

Due to the current high temperatures, dry fuel conditions and the occurrence of recent wildland fires, Stage I fire restrictions have been implemented for all trust lands throughout the Southern Ute Indian Reservation. Everyone on reservation land is asked to be very cautious and use common sense with fire this time of year.

Stage I Fire Restrictions prohibits acts for the general public, commercial operators and industrial oil and gas operators performing work on the Southern Ute Reservation.

The following acts are prohibited for the general public on reservation lands:

- 1. OPEN BURNING.** Burning of trash and/or yard waste is prohibited.
- 2. AGRICULTURAL BURNING.** Burning of crop land, fields, rangeland, debris burning, slash piles, prescribed burning and weed burn-

ing are prohibited.

- 3. CAMP FIRES.** Building, maintaining or using a warming fire or campfire outside of officially designated or developed camp sites is prohibited. The fire restrictions do not include charcoal fires (in suitable containers) for barbecues or fires for sweat ceremonies, however, such fires are not to be left unattended and are to be fully extinguished after use.
- 4. FIREWORKS.** Possession, discharging or use

of any type of fireworks is prohibited.

Commercial and Industrial restrictions can be obtained from the BIA Fire Office at 575 County Road 517 or by calling 970-563-4571. Anyone violating the provisions of this fire ban may be subject to prosecution outlined in the Southern Ute Indian Criminal Code.

The Restrictions will become effective at 0:01 AM, June 23, 2014 and will remain until conditions improve.

the Town of Ignacio now, but our main focus are homes for the tribal membership."

Baker then updated the commission on the success of Ute Nations Day and the Southern Ute Bear Dance.

"Our Culture Department put on a really nice recognition ceremony honoring tribal police from Southern Ute, Ute Mountain, Northern Ute and Jicarilla Apache," Baker said. "Bear Dance was a success as well."

Southern Ute Chairman, Clement J. Frost brought up the topic of Medicaid for tribal member spouses who are non-Native.

"A tribal member came to me and told me their non-Native spouse is not eligible for Medicaid. Our insurance is geared to cover the tribal member, not the spouse," Frost said. "But the insurance is effecting the spouse because they are not able to receive Medicaid."

The Medicaid representative assured Frost that the spouse should qualify and opted to talk to the chairman more in depth about the situation at a later time.

Colorado Lieutenant Governor Joseph Garcia surprised both tribes by presenting a Colorado state flag

from Governor John Hickenlooper. The flag was given to the tribes to be flown at the Native American Indigenous Games next month in Regina, Canada.

Lastly, Troy A. Eid, chairman of Indian Law and Order Commission, brought criminal statistics among Native juveniles to the roundtable.

"Native Juveniles get tried as adults 33 percent of the time where as non-Native juveniles only get tried as an adults one percent of the time," he said.

Eid also discussed the high PTSD, suicide and rape rates among Native youth.



Free museum passes for tribal members

Still thinking about that family trip during the summer, but unsure of where to go? Thanks to a partnership between the Southern Ute Indian Tribe and the Powerhouse Science Center (formerly Durango Discovery Museum); tribal members can now visit a vast variety of museums around the world for little-to-no cost.

The Powerhouse Science Center in Durango, Colo. is providing membership cards through the Association of Science Technology Centers (ASTC), which allows tribal members to visit a selection of museums from around the United States and other countries including Australia, Bermuda, Mexico, and Sweden just to name a few of many. Tribal members can pick up these cards at the Powerhouse Science Center and use them as passes when arriving at a museum. From there, tribal members are given entry either free of charge or for a low discounted price.

Elliot Hendren, Dewayne Hendren, Nate Hendren, and Issac Suina used these membership passes to visit several science centers, including the Explora Museum and New Mexico Museum of Natural History in Albuquerque.

The brothers hope other tribal members will use these passes to learn more about the sciences of the world.

"I would want people to use these passes because they can learn about different stuff," said Elliot Hendren. "If they get it, they can do new activities and learn new things about science."

The membership pass is absolutely free for all tribal members as part of an agreement with the Powerhouse Science Center. Members must provide their tribal membership card for verification before they get their pass. Once verified, they are given their pass as members of the ASTC with complete access to over 350 museums across the United States and other countries. There is a

\$40 value for the membership pass for all non-tribal members.

"We saw a lot at the museums we visited," said Issac Suina. "We saw dinosaur exhibits, learned how animals evolved, and saw videos of how volcanoes erupted. It was educational."

The Powerhouse Science Center is the only museum where tribal members aren't required to use their pass. Their information will be put into the science center's system, and from there a name can be searched when arriving for a visit.

4. Drugs and alcohol are not permitted on the Sun Dance grounds.
5. Cameras, tape/video recorders, food and water are not allowed in the Medicine Lodge area.
6. No metal chairs allowed inside the Medicine Lodge.
7. No cell phones!


Sharing culture at camp

Safety tips for the hot summer

The summer is a time where family and friends partake in many physical activities, both indoor and outdoor. Whether it's playing baseball on a sunny afternoon or hiking up a hillside in the mountains, safety is the number one precaution that always needs to be considered.

KEEPING SAFE AROUND WATER

One of the most well-known summer activities families enjoy is swimming. Families are encouraged to take a cool dip as the days get warmer, but they must also be fully aware of their surroundings when supervising their children and loved ones. Statistics have shown that from 2005-2009, there has been an average of 3,500 fatal unintentional drowning's, with 20 percent of the victims being the age of fourteen-years-old or younger. Yearly, approximately 80 percent of people who lose their lives to drowning are males.

In order to be safe in the water, swimmers must first become familiar with the water, according to SunUte Community Center fitness manager, Robin Duffy-Wirth. She addressed swimming lessons as the main solution for water safety.

"SunUte teaches over one-thousand children swimming lessons a year," she said. "Learning to swim and respecting the waters is the number one prevention in drowning. A lot of Native Americans don't have the resources to learn how to swim, but the Southern Ute Indian Tribe probably has one of the highest number of tribal members, per capita, that can swim compared to other tribes around the country."

Tribal members are offered free swimming lessons through SunUte with courses open to all ages. Non-tribal members can take these lessons for \$40 for up to six group lessons. In addition, tribal members can also participate in CPR training classes, which are also free. The community center wants members who come to their facility to be on their toes when the unexpected strikes.

"Parents aren't aware of how quickly a child can

drown," said Lisa Allen, aquatics coordinator SunUte Community Center. "There are risks involved when guardians are distracted. We just want everyone to have fun but to also leave alive and well everyday."

Statistics have stated that participation in formal swimming lessons can reduce the risk of drowning among children aged 1-to 4-years-old. There are other factors that contribute to water safety, like having a swimming partner, making sure swimmers aren't holding their breath underwater for long periods of time, and paying attention to the weather forecast if swimming outside.

In order to ensure the pools are secure, SunUte stations lifeguards in the pool area who work around the clock increase safety. However, accidents can still happen at the most sporadic times where even the lifeguards won't always be able to catch.

"A lot of parents have a false sense of security when they bring their kids to the pool because there are lifeguards present," said Robin Duffy-Wirth. "We're asking for the parents' to help by having their eyes on their kids at all times."

KEEPING SAFE IN THE SUN

Aside from swimming, safety precautions from other summer activities come into play, including staying fully hydrated and protecting your skin from the sun.

Thirst is an immediate sign of dehydration, and it is recommended that kids drink water every twenty-minutes when participating in physical activities.

Sports drinks are okay for hydration as they contain electrolytes for the body, but sodas, fruit drinks, and high-sugar juices are not advised.

For protected skin when out in the sun, it's recommended to use water-resistant sunblock that protects the skin from both UVA and UVB rays. According to the Skin Cancer Foundation, getting a blistering sunburn at a young age doubles the chances of developing melanoma. Regardless of age or skin color, it is advised that everyone wears sunblock when out in the sun, Duffy-Wirth said.





BURCH, STILL REMEMBERED

Reading the recent article written by Ace Stryker about Anthony Burch and the Southern Ute Veterans new memorial for the 70th anniversary of D-day, brought back memories of my time with Anthony Burch.

We were both in Fairbanks at the same time in the mid to late '80s early '90s; both ran sled dogs. I was the Stupidintendent of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Fairbanks, but my thrill job was being on the board of directors for the Yukon Quest International sled dog race. Anthony was interested in and ran sprint races with his team of dogs.

He lived in the small community of Two Rivers about 25-30 miles out the Chena Hot Springs Road from Fairbanks – a very well known location for both high powered teams and high powered mushers.

Each year to raise funds for the Quest (a 1,000-mile sled dog race running from Fairbanks, Alaska, to Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, Canada), there were various events: the Ivory Jack's Crab feed, price of a dinner for two with a drawing for \$40,000 at the end of the night, an all you can eat crab feed with the crab flown in by Alaska Airlines from Southeast Alaska and other like events.

Great fun and pure Alaskan.

Anthony would always be there. We'd sit with one another, talk dogs, eat the offerings, talk over Native Alaskan affairs and how they differed or were similar to those things where we were from.

I could spell "Ute" but had never met a tribal member. I was glad Anthony was there.

We were both Native Americans far away from our peoples doing the things that the Athabaskan people had historically done with dogs up and down the rivers and trails of Alaska's vast interior, and we were both veterans, WWII and Normandy for him, Vietnam for me. This is what veterans do.

In the years after our service, we were still doing things that we never dreamed we'd be doing, just as in the military. For me that meant being BIA superintendent for the Southern Ute Agency as well as one of the Tribal Court judges and even prosecuting on the Ute Mountain Ute Rez.

For Anthony it meant finally coming home to his people, living by the river, involving himself with matters involving horses and those he loved.

Anthony Burch is still with me.


Fishing FUNdamentals
