Chairman, council races headed to runoff

Runoff election to take place Dec. 12

None of the 11 candidates vying for a seat on Southern Ute Indian Tribal Council secured the majority vote in the general election Friday, Nov. 7. Therefore, the top two candidates for chairman, and the top four candidates for the open council seats will compete in a special runoff election Friday, Dec. 12.

According to voting results certified by Tribal Council on Wednesday, Nov. 12 Clement J. Frost and Joycelyn Peabody Dutchie will participate

in a runoff election for Tribal Chairman. Frost received 48.4 percent of the votes, and Dutchie tallied 26.4 percent of the votes. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes in the Dec. 12 election will become the next chairman of the Southern Ute Indian Tribe.

Bernie Cuthair who was also seeking chairmanship received 25.2 percent of the votes and will not move forward to the runoff election.

The top four council candidates advancing to the runoff are: Aaron V. Torres with 28.3 percent, Amy J. Barry with 33.4 percent,

Janelle F. Doughty with 24.4 percent, and Tyson Thompson with 33 percent.

Those council candidates not proceeding to the runoff: Pathimi M. GoodTracks with 22.8 percent, Renee J. Cloud with 11.4 percent, David Latham with 24 percent, and Andrew C. Frost with 22.4 percent.

There are 911 registered Southern Ute voters. A total of 520 ballots were cast for a voter turnout of 57.1 percent.

The last day to register to vote and request an absentee ballot for the Dec. 12 election is Tuesday, Dec. 2.

Ignacio Schools and RTA Architects win awards

Ignacio School District 11-JT's Ignacio Middle School was awarded the AIA Colorado Merit Award for Built Architecture and the AIA Colorado South Honor award for Built Architecture, by the American Institute of Architects. The awards were presented on Oct. 9 at the Silverthorne Pavilion in Silverthorne, Colorado. Members of AIA Colorado and its local sections (AIA Denver, AIA Colorado North and AIA Colorado South) submitted 188 entries resulting in 17 architectural design awards.

The new Ignacio Middle School was the first phase of a comprehensive District-wide Master Plan completed by RTA Architects in 2011. Construction of the middle school was completed in August of 2013. Design team members include: HCDA Structural Engineers, ME&E Engineering, DHM - Durango, and Goff Engineering.

The final design takes advantage of the site, views, and natural surroundings, provides a supportive and

engaging environment, offers adaptive and flexible learning environments for the future, and introduces daylight from two sides into the classrooms.

The high performing, sustainable facility gently touches the site by stepping the building with the natural grade, using low-water native plants for landscaping, and orienting the building to views of the La Plata Mountains to the northwest and passive solar strategies to the south. Incorporation of the sacred geometries of the Southern Ute Tribe reflects the multi-cultural heritage of the region and community.

As a Community partner, the Ignacio School District

provides an engaging education for all students in a safe, positive, and respectful environment.

And they couldn't tip the whole thing off in a better place, with any more splendid style.







IMPORTANT NEWS

The Tribal Health Department along with the Tribal Council had many changes this past year to better serve the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Members. There have been staff additions and new programs implemented.

We have a wonderful staff with many years of experience in Benefits Coordination and Contract Health.

BENEFITS STAFF

Erika Atencio has worked for the Tribe for 13 years, 8 of which have been with the Tribal Health Department. She is currently works for the Department as a Benefits Coordinator and is one of the direct contacts for members and providers on medical, dental, vision and pharmacy benefits. She also provides support for patient related travel and tribal member employee premium reimbursement. She is always happy to talk with the members and address any of their questions or concerns. Erika can be reached at 970-563-4704 or extension 2211.

Elizabeth (Cindy) Gallegos has worked as a Benefits Coordinator for about 14 years in a couple of settings, the Southern Ute Health center for 7 years and the Tribal Health Department for the last 7 years. She lives in Ignacio with her son Andrew. Cindy also helps with the Contract Health Services provide through the Southern Ute Health Center. Cindy can be reached at 970-563-4813 or extension 2203.

Misha Weaver started with the Tribal Health Department in 2005. She just recently came back to the Department as a Benefits Coordinator. She is one of the other direct contacts for members and providers in regard to the medical, dental, vision and pharmacy benefits. She also provides support for patient related travel and tribal member employee premium reimbursement. Misha can be reached at 970-563-4716 or extension 2204.

It's been a very busy year as the Southern Ute Indian Tribe has worked through the reorganization of the Tribal Member Health Benefit Plan. The Tribe has identified several existing networks to provide Tribal Members with services that are normally not provided through the Southern Ute Health Center.

Medical coverage is with First Health Network through a third party administrator, Capitol Administrators. It is always important to remember to use your employer based coverage (Anthem BCBS, Rocky Mountain HMO, Aetna, etc.) or any other coverages (Medicare, Medicaid, CHP, etc.) first. When going to an outside of the Health Center medical provider please provide them with your other coverage cards first and then your Tribal Member Benefit card (First Health) secondary. Your secondary card will pick up any co-pays, co-insurances or deductibles.

To locate in network providers please go to the following website www.firsthealthnetwork.com. If you need to order new medical cards please contact Capitol Administrators at 1-800-331-5301.

Dental coverage is with Delta Dental Network and to locate an in network dentist to can go to their website at www.deltadentalco.com. If you need to order new dental cards please contact Delta Dental at 1-800-610-0201. If you have another Delta Dental plan through an employer please use your Tribal Member Delta Dental plan to pay for your services. You will have a greater maximum benefit allowance and you will also have no co-pays, co-insurances or deductibles as long as you use an in network provider.

Vision coverage is with Vision Service Plan (VSP). To locate in network providers please go to the following website www.vsp.com. You will not have a card for your VSP coverage and you are identifiable to the provider by your SSN #. If you have

another VSP through an employer please use your Tribal Member VSP to pay for your services. You will also have no co-pays, co-insurances or deductibles as long as you use an in network provider.

Pharmacy coverage is with the Pequot Pharmaceutical Program. It is always important to remember to use your employer based coverage (Anthem BCBS, Rocky Mountain HMO, Aetna, etc.) or any other coverages (Medicare, Medicaid, CHP, etc.) first for your medications, if you have unique situations please discuss with your provider to ensure you get your medications filled in a timely fashion. When going outside of the Southern Ute Health Center Pharmacy, please provide them with your other coverage cards first and then your Tribal Member Benefit card (First Health) secondary. Your secondary card will pick up any co-pays or co-insurances.

CONTRACT HEALTH SERVICES

Medical/dental care provided at the Southern Ute Health Center is called Direct Care. The Contract Health Program is for Medical/Dental care provide outside the Health Center. If Contract Health Program is requested to pay, then a patient must meet the residency requirements, notification requirements, medical priority and use of alternate resources.

An easy way to access benefit information anytime is the Colorado PEAK program. It is an online service for Coloradans to check for Eligibility and application for Medical benefits.

The Family Center of Colorado is another source available to apply for Alternate resources they can be reached at 970-385-4747 (Durango) or 970-884-4747 (Bayfield).

Please remember a referral is not a guarantee of payment. If you are not sure if your referral will be covered by Contract Health, please call us for more information coordinating your health benefits.

HELP WITH YOUR CHILD'S EDUCATION

You play a major role in your child's education.

This includes working with your child and his or her school to ensure they get a quality education.

No matter their age or grade, it is never too late to get involved.

In each issue of the Drum we will provide some tips, guidelines, and ways you can have an active role in your child's education.

SCHOOL TARDINESS

Make sure your child gets to school on time.

Being even a few min-

utes late can negatively impact learning. Plan ahead to avoid the morning rush.

Each night:

- Make sure homework is complete
- Have clothes ready for the next day
- Have lunches packed or lunch money ready (if necessary)
- Have school bags/backpacks packed and ready

As students get older delegate some of these tasks to them and make sure they have a reliable ride to school.

SCHOOL ABSENCES

Avoid school absences with by having your student practice some of these healthy habits:

- Eating healthy meals and snacks
- Washing hands regularly
- Immunizations are up to date
- Physical activity (within reason)
- And getting plenty of rest

If your student is sick do not send him or her to school however, make sure you follow the school policies in reporting absences and tardiness, as well as returning to school after an absence.

Be sure the school has updated contact information so you can be reached if your student doesn't show up for school. Keep track of absences to ensure your student doesn't miss an excessive amount of school.

The attending veterans were treated with a praising eagle dance provided by tribal members from Laguna Pueblo. Members from various organizations with relations to the Veterans Affairs hosted discussions that cover specific resources and agreements for the veterans. These discussions included coverage of the Affordable Care Act and Medicaid.

"It's important to acknowledge all the veterans here today as well as those who have fallen protecting this country," Dr. Leonard Thomas from the Indian Health Services said. "[Indian Health Services] are wanting to improve our ability to provide care for the veterans as we establish better coordination of care. We serve 27 different locations all across New Mexico, Colorado, and the Southwest. We want this to move forward in a positive action with full results."

A memorandum of understanding (MOU) between the Veterans Association and Indian Health Services was signed in 2010 to ensure support for the veterans.

Today, the goals for the MOU include the establishment of coordination, collaboration, and resource sharing between the Veterans Association and Indian Health Services while improving the health status of American Indian and Alaskan Native veterans. The MOU aims to foster an environment that brings together strengths and expertise from each organization to improve care and services provided by both.

Joseph Suina, governor of the Cochiti Pueblo, spoke


to the veterans regarding his military experience and his influence of becoming a leader.

"It's been almost 50 years and it feels like it was yesterday," he said. "In a matter of months I experienced the worst possible deed that totally turned my world upside down. I think everyone who comes back home comes back with a lot of guilt. I remind myself of a time where things were difficult whenever I feel sorry for myself. I believe in our traditional way that nothing is impossible, and that's why I wanted to be there for my people

and show them support. You must always be here in the present, because the present really is a gift for all of us."

Every year, the symposium continues to gratefully honor all the services and sacrifices made by the veterans through voice, music, and heritage. As the resources and services for veterans continue to expand, support for the heroes will always continue to expand with it.

"We must keep our songs, our heritage, and our tradition alive," said Suina. "We must always fight for those things as American Indians."



A grass dancer flourishes in bright colors during the grand entry of the Southern Ute Veterans Powwow.



Choosing to forego the Webb Toyota/Kirtland (N.M.) Central Basin Invitational, as well as selecting to attend the Centauri-hosted Mountain Top Classic – rather than Meeker’s White River Electric Shootout – didn’t do the Ignacio Lady Bobcats any favors.

But Shane Seibel’s squad knows nothing good ever comes easy.

And the 2014-15 season will tip off with IHS owning a chance to spring what could be one of the campaign’s most massive upsets when the Lady Cats head east on Tuesday, Dec. 2 to battle Pagosa Springs – coming off a 25-1 year in which the Intermountain League rulers’ only loss was to Broomfield Holy Family in the Class 3A State Championship.

On Day 2 of the Classic, IHS is scheduled to face reigning 4A Western Slope League champions Glenwood Springs, with the Lady Demons coming off an awesome 23-2, 14-0 run and hungry to avenge their loss to Monument Palmer Ridge in the 4A Tournament’s ‘Sweet 16.’

will likewise be bent on proving their loss to Peyton in the 2A-Region 8 Tournament’s title game was also a fluke, and are – as of this writing (Friday, Nov. 7) – slated to be the Lady Bobcats’ opposition on Day 3 of the Mountain Top. RHS went 17-7 overall, and 12-2 in the Santa Fe League last winter.

Calling the SunUte Community Center court its primary home this season, Ignacio’s home opener then follows on the Friday, Dec.

FLY-FISHING

I Am Thankful

It’s November, and it seems anyone writing a column does a “Being Thankful” column. Well, I’m no different.

Last September, while standing in the middle of an area comprised of 2,221,776 acres or 3,472 square miles, after having fly fished the Fire Hole River, the Madison River, and Soda Butte Creek, it dawned on me how thankful I was for the establishment of Yellowstone National Park.

Now this is where those who know my political views are going to think I have been frequenting the newest retail stores of Colorado. I am eternally grateful to President Ulysses S. Grant and the Congress of 1872.

That is who passed the legislation establishing Yellowstone National Park as the first National Park. Imagine politicians actually doing something good; I don’t think it has happened since.

I was there in September, fly-fishing with a group of friends from Texas. I have fished the Park on several occasions, but it was special fishing with friends new to the Park. While fly-fishing with them, I came up with a great way for someone who has never fished the Park to have a great experience. It is not necessary to stay in the Park, but it is helpful to plan

on spending five or six days in the area.

On day one take a small bus tour of Yellowstone. Be sure and take a good map. As you see and cross over the rivers and streams mark on your map areas that look fishy. Many of the tour drivers are avid fly fishers so ask your driver about the areas you saw. On day two, hire a guide that specializes in fly-fishing the park. At the end of the day, after he has seen your fly-fishing skills, show him your map and ask for his suggestions

on places to fish. I have always found guides happy to share locations with me.

For days three through five, fish with a buddy or by yourself. You’ll enjoy it either way. Along with all your fly-fishing gear be sure and add a camera. One day I had an elk lie down on the bank and watch me fly fish for over an hour. I’ve also had bison walk next to my truck as I got my gear on. These are pictures you don’t want to miss because no one will believe you without proof. You’ll also want some grip and grin photos of native fish. There is no stocking in Yellowstone.

If lake fishing is what you really want to do there are lakes in Yellowstone; the largest being Yellowstone Lake. It has 131.74 square miles of surface area and 141 miles of shoreline; it’s also home to some very large trout.

I think the best time to go to Yellowstone is after Labor Day. A large percentage of the crowds have left the area. However, if you go during the summer, don’t despair. With over two million acres you will be able to find a place to cast your fly.

President Grant and the Congress of 1872 truly created a national treasure by creating Yellowstone National Park. Their actions also put into place the beginnings of the entire national park system. President Grant and your Congress, thank you.

fellow Skyhawks will host the 2015 Heartland/Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference Challenge at the SunUte Community Center, with Fort Lewis facing St. Mary’s University at 7 p.m. on Day 1 – following the conclusion of the 5 p.m. tilt pitting Western New Mexico [Silver City, NM] University against University of Texas-Permian Basin.

From San Antonio, Texas SMU’s Rattlers are coming off a FLC-esque season in which they went 19-9 overall and 12-6 in the Heartland Conference, and reached the South Central Region Tournament in Denver where they fell to then-13th-ranked

Colorado School of Mines. WNMU will then meet St. Mary’s in the 5 p.m. game on Day 2 of the Classic, with the Hawks then squaring off against Odessa, Texas-based UTPB at 7 p.m. Predicted to finish fourth in the Heartland’s preseason poll (SMU was tabbed to take second), the Falcons’ 2013-14 season produced the school’s D-II-record 17 wins, but also 11 losses – including in the HC Championships’ title game.

St. Mary’s had won the HC’s two previous post-season tournaments, before being denied a third in March by eventual winners Texas A&M International.

FLC head coach Bob Hof-

man, now 341-181 (.653) overall and 232-108 (.682) in the RMAC with ‘Colorado’s Campus in the Sky,’ could not be reached for comment before the Drum’s early deadline, but likely for good reason as the Skyhawks had already hit the road for their final tune-up tests.

Unfortunately, results of Fort Lewis’ exhibition games against NAIA Frontier Conference members University of Montana [Dillon, Mont.] Western and Westminster [Salt Lake City, Utah] College. Results were also unavailable for the Nov. 10 match up in Fort Collins against NCAA Div. I Colorado State University.
