Monument designation remains uncertain for Bears Ears

Time is running out for an official decision from the White House on the future of the Bears Ears National Monument. Secretary of the Interior Ryan Zinke toured the Bears Ears in early May, 2017 as part of the review process. August 24 marks the deadline.

"Based on the Interim Report, we are anticipating that Secretary Zinke will be submitting a recommendation to downsize, or rescind the monument status all together," said Leland Begay, Assoc. General Council for Dept. Of Justice, Ute Mountain Ute Tribe. "We behalf of the Native American Rights Fund."

President Barack Obama designated the Bears Ears National Monument in 2016 under The Antiquities Act. The Bears Ears is the only monument designated at the request of a coalition of Native American tribes: Navajo, Hopi, Zuni and Ute.

"We as Native people have [negatively] impacted

Bear Smart: Getting one step ahead

This summer bears have been raiding trash cans across the Southern Ute Indian Reservation and throughout the region. The Southern Ute Indian Tribe recently hosted an informational presentation in conjunction with Bear Smart Durango, on Tuesday, August 8 to combat the problem. The presentation titled, Talking Trash: Human & Bear conflicts in the Southwest was led by Bear Smart Education Director, Karen Hickerson.

"We had an employee walk out of the Mouache-Capote Building and right into a bear," said Don Brockus, Risk Coordinator for the Southern Ute Indian Tribe. "We thought there was some need for education."

"This year has definitely been one of the worst," Hickerson said in regards to heightened bear activity in urban areas. The Bear Smart motto is, 'Helping people and bears coexist.' "We're proactive to make sure the bears stay bears and do not become too habituated," Hickerson said.



said Southern Ute Wildlife Division Director Steve Whiteman. "As long as those food sources are made inaccessible, then the bears will move on."

"If the bear is a direct threat to a person, or property, as a last resort, we will set a trap and relocate." Whiteman said.

One bear on Tribal Campus was very recently captured and relocated to Archuleta Mesa. "We've trapped and relocated a number of bears this summer," Whiteman said. The number of phone calls from tribal members, and the number of trapped bears is a result of their persistent activity, he added.

Tribe favors relocation over proximately seven pounds of euthanization," said Captain Charles Hamby of the Southern Ute Tribal Rangers. "They consider the bear a sacred animal. The Tribe spect towards bears."

Setting up electric fencing helps, this can be particularly useful if you have fruit trees, bee hives or a chicken coop, which bears will see as an easy source of food. A BBQ grill that has been neglected, will attract unwanted bears, regular cleanings are advisable. Even dog food will attract bears.

Bears have an uncanny sense of smell, picking up odors from as far as two miles away, according to Bear Smart Durango. A bear's sense of smell is 100 times that of a human. Try swapping out artificial bird feeders with natural flower boxes, hummingbirds will still make regular visits to harvest nectar from the flowers.

Bear's have a very good the same place they found food previously, but according to recent research conducted in the Durango area by Colorado Parks and Wildlife, bears will stay in their natural rangelands if it's a good food year, if their foods are available naturally.

Due to an unusually late frost in the spring, natural food sources for bears are scarce. "This year, they are motivated," Hickerson said.

The White Mesa Mill is the last conventional uranium mill in the U.S. That mill is located three miles outside of the White Mesa community; it is also a waste disposal site, which could ultimately impact the Navajo Aquifer, a vital source of clean water for the region's inhabitants, according to Begay. "There are a lot of areas of concern in regard to uranium," he said. "The Tribes point of view is that this is their native homeland."

Health advisory for the 842 Fire

Areas of smoke from the lightning caused wildfire near Bayfield will be more visible as fire crews are adding 300 more acres to produce a low intensity fire. This will prevent the wildfire from advancing while OTHER TIPS TO also reducing heavy fuel loads on the landscape. If smoke is thick or becomes noticeably thicker in your area you should remain indoors or if possible seek out locations where air is filtered. Unusually sensitive people throughout the HD Mountains and Chimney Rock National Monument should consider reducing prolonged or heavy exertion. The public can expect to see moderate amounts of smoke in these areas along Colorado Highway 151 and U.S. Highway 160.

San Juan Basin Public Health advises that if visibility is less than five miles, smoke has reached levels that are unhealthy. This is especially true for those with heart disease, respiratory illnesses, the very young, and the elderly. Consider limiting outdoor activity when moderate to heavy smoke is

Staff report present. People with heart San Juan National or lung disease, older adults, Forest Service and children should avoid prolonged or heavy exertion; everyone else should reduce prolonged or heavy exertion. Consider relocating temporarily if smoke is present indoors and is making you ill.

PROTECT YOURSELF

- · Close windows and doors and stay inside. However, do not close up your home tightly if it makes it dangerously warm inside.
- Only if they are filtered, run the air conditioning, your evaporative cooler, or the fan feature on your home heating system (with the heat turned off). Keep the outdoor air intake closed and be sure the filter is clean. Filtered air typically has less smoke than the air outdoors. Running these appliances if they are not filtered can make indoor smoke worse.
- Use HEPA room air filtration units if you have
- Avoid smoking and/ or secondhand smoke, vacuuming,

and other sources of additional air pollution.

• Do not use paper dust masks; these do not filter out the particles and gasses in smoke.

As temperatures cool in the evening inversion conditions worsen and smoke in low lying areas may become thicker, especially if the outdoor air is still. It tends to be worst near dawn.

- · Close bedroom windows at night.
- To prepare for nighttime smoke, consider airing out your home during the early or middle of the afternoon when smoke tends to be more diluted. Use your best judgment. If smoke is thick during the day, follow the tips above.

Please contact your primary health care provider if symptoms persist or become more severe.

Dive team training at Nighthorse

A hand rises from the silt, its fingers raised upwards towards the light. The water swirls around the lakebed and the view of the whole mannequin emerges. We push the mesh bag down to the lakebed and begin the task of recovering the "victim". As soon as we make contact with the bottom, our fins kick up the silt and it becomes as dark as night with no way to see your own hand in front of your face. The work quickly deteriorates into feeling the bag and the buckles to slide the mannequin into the bag and fastened it down for its trip upward. Soon the lift bags are attached and the "victim" rises towards the surface and we complete the recovery.

In August, the Four Corners Dive Team trained and practiced alongside the New Mexico State Police Dive Team. Trainings were held

Staff report Lake and at Lake Night-SU POLICE DEPT. horse, Durango, Colo. This training included Southern Ute Police personnel working alongside Los Pinos Fire and La Plata County Sherriff personnel. The teams were joined for a single day by Southern Ute tribal member Raymond Baker for some technical training and planning. Baker has thirty years of experience in the Navy working in search and rescue across the world.

The technical training in-

cluded reading the screen of the Lowrance sidescan sonar to understand the bottom of the lake and features. Teams practiced searching for the outline of a sunken houseboat in 150 feet of water in Lake Navajo. They spent time along the shorelines looking at the mannequin, trees, boulders and other items to see how to interpret each item correctly as the boat passed over them.

As the dive teams passed over submerged forty foot tall pines, they could see all the branches even down to the trunk and lakebed fifty feet below. The water temperature was a comfortable 72 degrees at the surface but a frigid 40 degrees forty feet down. The intense cold


