# Girls on the run!

Hundreds of girls gathered at Three Springs in Durango, Saturday, Nov. 4 to support and encourage each other through a 5k run that they have been preparing ten weeks for. Boys and Girls Club (BGC) introduced the program to four of their students last year, grades third through fifth, this year the number of participants grew to ten. Girls on the Run (GOTR) inspires girls to build lives of purpose and to make a meaningful contribution to community and society.

GOTR was created to culminate with girls positively impacting their communities through a service project and being physically and emotionally prepared to complete a celebratory 5K event. It is a ten week program for girls who are in third through eighth grade and helps them develop essential skills to better navigate their worlds and establish a lifetime appreciation for health and fitness. GOTR is a national program and BGC is part of the Western Colorado

Chapter. "The girls really





Red Willow Production Company has created a Landman I Trainee Program for a Southern Ute tribal member. This unique opportunity is designed to provide training and experience for up to two years; when the trainee has successfully completed the trainee program the tribal member will move into the Landman I position at the starting salary. "They will have someone mentoring them every step of the way," Red Willow Production Company Senior Landman, Art Vermillion said, "I really hope that tribal members will see what a great opportunity is being offered here."

Once successfully working in a Landman I position, further training, experience and certification can lead to a career that is both fulfilling and profitable. "Historically, we have had to hire people from the outside that already have experience," Vermillion explained. "This is a unique opportunity for a Southern Ute tribal member to stay in the community and give back to the Tribe," he said.

The program is broken into three levels. Level I has a starting salary of \$23 per hour and can last up to 6 months. The trainee will should become proficient and gain an understanding of different Land Department processes including: how to review titles and other land documents, and land concepts. Level II starts at \$26 per hour and can also last up





WHEREAS, the family is the core unit of the Southern Ute culture; and

WHEREAS, Family Group Decision Making is a voluntary process which recognizes that the family itself is the best judge of how to meet family members' needs and families have certain responsibilities and roles that cannot be delegated; and

WHEREAS, the family knows what is needed to find the best solution, and the family leads the decision making practice; and

WHEREAS, Family Group Decision Making is a way to assist the family in realizing their strengths, and their ability to create positive solutions by returning to a strong, traditional way of problem

WHEREAS, in recognition of the importance of Family Group Decision Making to our community, the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Council passed Resolution No. 2017-202, wherein Tribal Council expressed its commitment to this traditional decision making practice and its implementation within

NOW, THEREFORE, in recognition of the foregoing, the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Council designates the month of November, henceforth as

# PINUNUUCHI FAMILY GROUP DECISION MAKING MONTH

for the Southern Ute Indian Reservation, and encourages this traditional vision of empowering Southern Ute families to own and address their own family matters through the Family Group Decision Making practice.

**RESOLUTION NO. 2017-202** 

# RESOLUTION COUNCIL OF THE SOUTHERN UTE INDIAN TRIBE October 31, 2017

WHEREAS, authority is vested in the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Council by the Constitution adopted by the Southern Ute Indian Tribe, and approved November 4, 1936, and amended October 1, 1975, and August 27, 1991, to act for the Southern Ute Indian Tribe; and

WHEREAS, under Article VII, Section 1(a) of the Constitution, the Tribal Council may, among other things, appoint subordinate boards, commissions, and committees and prescribe their duties; and

WHEREAS, the Tribe formed an interdepartmental group called the Family Group Decision Making Work Group, including Tribal Court, Family Court Support Office, Probation, Division of Social Services, Family Preservation Unit, Tribal Services Department, Tribal Health, Education Department, Cultural Preservation Department, Southern Ute Police Department/Community Resource Officers, Southern Ute Victim Services, Tribal Credit, Tribal Housing; who work together to support the Family Group Decision Making process and its implementation; and

WHEREAS, Family Group Decision Making is a voluntary process in which the family leads the decision making practice based on the recognition that families have certain responsibilities and roles that cannot be delegated, that the family knows what is needed to find the best solution, and that the family itself is the best judge of how to meet family members' needs; and

WHEREAS, the overall purpose of Family Group Decision Making is to assist the family in returning to their own strong, traditional way of problem solving and to give the family an opportunity to create a path leading to positive solutions for a safe, healthy family; and

WHEREAS, the collective intent of Family Group Decision Making is to provide system change regarding service provision for client families prior to system involvement where familydirected support and healing can change outcomes; and

WHEREAS, under Resolution No. 2016-33, and Resolution No. 2017-27, Tribal Council authorized the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Court to submit grant applications to the Colorado Division of Criminal Justice, Office of Adult and Juvenile Justice Assistance to support implementation costs for Family Group Decision Making; and

WHEREAS, the Tribe has used the grant funding to offer Family Group Decision Making services to community members who are referred to the process by a Tribal department or other cooperating agency or entity and who accept the referral as the best approach for their family; and

WHEREAS, Southern Ute Tribal leadership has encouraged and endorsed the practice of Family Group Decision Making as a traditional way to empower Southern Ute families to own and address their family matters; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Council recognizes the importance of Family Group Decision Making to our community and encourages and endorses this traditional decision making practice.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Council is committed to the Family Group Decision Making practice and its implementation within the Southern Ute Indian

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Council or, in his absence, the Vice Chairman, or, in the absence of both the Chairman and the Vice Chairman, a duly appointed Acting Chairman is authorized to execute the necessary documents and take all necessary actions to carry out the intent of this resolution.

This resolution was duly adopted on the  $31^{\text{st}}$  day of October, 2017.







# Rabid skunks found in La Plata County

Three rabid animals (skunks) have tested positive for rabies in Duran-Health (SJBPH) urges residents to stay away from stray and wild animals, check pets' vaccination status, and take other precautions to avoid rabies.

Rabies is regularly found in Colorado wildlife, especially skunks and bats. Interaction between humans and wild animals, particularly bats, skunks, foxes, and raccoons, increases the risk of rabies exposure to pets and people. If you see wildlife that is acting unusual, call SJBPH at 970-247-5702 or La Plata County Animal Protection at 970-385-2900 immediately.

It is also crucial to make sure all dogs and cats are vaccinated. The vaccine can prevent companion animals from getting rabies from wildlife and possibly exposing your whole family to the disease.

According to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, 150 animals have been found carrying rabies in the state so far, this year, of which 79 were skunks. The numbers represent only animals that were tested after they were witnessed exhibiting abnormal behaviors or

# To avoid rabies

- · Never touch or feed wild or stray animals. Don't leave pet food outdoors. If you see a sick or orphaned animal, do not touch it; instead contact La Plata County Animal Protection.
- Vaccinate your pets. Use a licensed veterinarian, and make sure you keep up with pets' booster shots.
- Leash your dog. Protect dogs and wildlife by keeping your pet on a leash while walking or hiking.
- Keep cats and other pets inside at night. Keep dogs within your sight (in a fenced yard or on leash) during the day while outside.
- Call your veterinarian promptly if you believe your pet has been exposed to a wild animal.
- Vaccinate pastured animals annually. Have a licensed veterinarian administer an approved large-animal
- Bat-proof your home. Information is available at www. cdc.gov/rabies/bats/management

# To recognize sick wildlife

- · Many healthy wild animals are normally afraid of humans; sick animals often do not run away when spotted by people.
- Wildlife with rabies may act aggressively or will violently approach people or pets.
- Some rabid animals are overly quiet and passive and want to hide. Don't bother them.
- Rabid wildlife might have trouble walking, flying, eating or drinking.





### **DEAR TRIBAL MEMBERS**

The tribal General Election is passed and we are now prepping for a Run-Off Election. Thank you for the support.

The issues I would focus attention to:

- 1. Employment and retention of enrolled Southern Ute tribal member employees. I want to know the reasons why people have chosen to resign or have been terminated. I want to go beyond what is on paper - sometimes, the truth is between the lines and truth-seeking is best achieved with face-to-face interaction - and hear directly from the people. It cannot always be the tribal members fault, right? It also cannot always be the 'Tribe' or the supervisor at fault, as well. I find it important to ensure tribal members are given fairness and opportunity to work for our tribal government.
- 2. There is a lot to be said for having tribal policies and procedures: 1) Policies direct the mission of departments and outline the duties for staff 2) Policies help staff understand what is acceptable worktime behavior and helps to provide uniformity among staff 3) Policies protect employees and tribal members from conflict 4) Propose timelines for achieving department and employee goals 5) Policies are intended to outline the fairness and equality of distributing tribal resources to each enrolled member 6) Procedures may include flow charts, step-by-step instructions on how to do a job, or any other manner to explain how each task should be performed.
  - It is important for our tribal departments to follow their policies. Otherwise, why have any?
- 3. Public Law 93-638 Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act. The Southern Ute Tribe has used P.L. 93-638 in the past. The most notable examples are the Southern Ute Police Department and the Southern Ute Health Center. It is a not a new concept for us. It is somewhat troublesome in terms of our healthcare. Many misconceptions, misperceptions, and

misunderstandings have evolved. Ed- DEAR TRIBAL MEMBERS OF THE ucation of our tribal members, tribal council members, clinic staff, and our vendors might help to resolve these issues. We can find a solution. We need to work toward solutions, together, as

- 4. Southern Ute Montessori School. I admit I do not know much about the school. I do hear the stories, some good, some not very positive. We are now needing a director. Has one been selected? I have been told this is more like a public school where non-Indian children can attend, is this true? Has the purpose of the school shifted to an unidentifiable one than when it was first opened? How can we make the school more 'tribal'? This is school is important. It should be used as a school that teaches our young tribal members what being Ute is and why they should be proud to call themselves Ute. We need to have traditional ways taught so our culture does not die. Starting with the children is the best starting point.
- **5. Environment.** Picnic Flats is devastated. Let us admit this, we allowed open pits in that area and now we are having to figure out how to reclaim this area. It is concerning to me and it should be concerning to each tribal member. If we allow the oil & gas operations to become like this in this rural part of the reservation, are we culpable of allowing this in other areas of the reservation, too?
- **6. Allotments.** Some people do not want any assistance with theirs. Others, want the help. The Bureau of Indian Affairs has, for the most part, pulled away from this debate. You want a solution, we need to figure this out together.
- 7. Growth Fund. If we are not making as much money as we once were why is the upper management still making the same money including bonuses?
- **8.** Culture. I grew up with my culture. I know my culture. I do not speak my language but I can understand it since my grandparents and my parents are native Ute speakers - it is their first language. My culture is irreplaceable. I think we need to bring cultural teachings back and provide the children the opportunity to be proud of who and where they come from, just like so many of us had those opportunities growing up with our grandparents.

These are some issues I think that are important. I know there are many more issues that are of concern to many tribal members. We can find solutions. We can do this together.

I also must stress, that each tribal member elected to the Tribal Council is an individual, bringing their own education background, life and employment experiences, and skill level to the Council. Working together as a team is absolutely important. Negotiation, debate, and compromise are important and they are skills. I know I possess these skills. I do.

One person cannot change the world or plan for the future of our tribe, we must do so collectively. Promises and words mean nothing without the Tribal Council working as a team, supporting one another and one another's ideas.

These are just my thoughts and ideas I think are important. These require longterm commitment. I am willing to commit

# Prescribed fire in Sandoval Canyon, beginning Nov. 1

BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS

Southern Ute Agency Fire Management is planning to burn piles in Sandoval Canyon. The 120 acre burn is located on the Southern Ute Indian Reservation, north of Archuleta County Road 500 along Southern Ute Route 156. The legal description for the burn is

Staff report township 33N, Range 4W, Sections 29 & 30, and Township 32N, Range 4W, Sections 5, 6, & 7. The purpose of the burn is to reduce activity fuels from previous treatments.

> Smoke may be visible from County Road 500 and in the vicinity of Arboles. Drivers are encouraged to use caution in the event smoke settles into the road corridor.

The prescribed fire is planned to begin starting Nov. 1, 2017 and continue for up to 6 months. The burn is dependent on weather/burning conditions and will be implemented when these conditions are favorable.
