Staff Report to non-Indians on roads od, Tribal Council was also as it has been, 0.08, and Ininterested in hearing from dian drivers with BACs of the public on the appropriate blood alcohol content (BAC) for an offense that the Tribe is considering adding to the current Traffic Code—Driving with an Excessive Blood Alcohol Content (known as DUI Per Se under Colorado law). This is a separate offense from driving under the influence (DUI) and Driving While Ability Impaired (DWAI) and is, therefore, a proposed new offense that does not exist in the Tribe's current Traffic Code that was drafted before Colorado adopted a DUI Per Se law. The BAC level to charge an Indian with driving under the influ-

0.05 to 0.08 will be charged with DWAI.

In the revised Traffic Code, the Tribal Council, wanted to avoid an overlap in the BAC level for the DUI offense and the Driving with an Excessive BAC offense. In Colorado, a driver whose BAC is measured at 0.08 or higher can be charged with both DUI and DUI Per Se. In other words, both offenses can be charged, although sentencing can be imposed on only one of the offenses if the defendant is convicted of both. To avoid the confusion to tribal members that non-Indians experience in

Tribal member health and safety is among the top concerns for the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Council. One of Chairman Sage's priorities is to increase tribal member communication, including law enforcement and emergency situations. "It is important to keep the tribal membership informed of emergencies, especially those that affect the tribal campus and local area," stat-

ed Chairman Christine Sage. Recent law enforcement events have highlighted a greater need for emergency communication within our community. The Southern Ute Indian Tribe would like to utilize a free, national, high-speed emergency notification solution called CodeRED. The Emergency Telephone Service Association of La Plata County ("ETSA") provides CodeRED. SunUte launches the Fill the Gap program; with a new director at the helm, SunUte Community Center's Recreation and Fitness Departments have taken a new approach to the common phrase " (lending) giving a helping hand."

Fill the Gap is a combined initiative meant to help the Boys and Girls Club of the Southern Ute Indian Tribe (BGC) when they are unable to provide activities to the BGC kids, or when the schools are closed.

"We want the kids to feel more at home at SunUte and we also want to provide them with a safe environment," acting Fitness Director Abel Velasquez said.

On Monday, Feb. 19, the Recreation Department will be taking the kids to Pagosa Springs for snowtubing, weather permitting, or to get some R&R at the hot springs.







How to have a healthy heart

February is American Heart Month, and a great time to get back to those New Year's resolutions, and take steps to improve heart health. There are many risk factors for heart attacks and stroke. Some we can control, and some we can't. Here are some ways to lower your risk.

- Quit smoking. Smoking increases your blood pressure and cholesterol. It also hardens blood vessels. If you need help quitting, contact the Southern Ute Health Center or 1-800-QUIT-NOW 800-7848-669) to make your quit easier.
- Get moving. Most of us don't get all the exercise our bodies need to keep us in tip-top shape. At least

30 minutes of moderate intensity (break a sweat) exercise, at least five days a week can keep you feeling and functioning your best. Start slow and listen to your body. Talk to your doctor if you are not sure what your body can handle.

- Cut back on sugar. With its many deceiving names (high fructose corn syrup, fructose, sucrose, etc.), • sugar is everywhere. Steer clear of sodas and other sweetened drinks. They pack a punch with calories, and are bad for heart health.
- Fill your plate with fresh (or frozen) vegetables and fruit. These fill you up, and are a great source of fiber, vitamins, and antioxidants.
- seeds, fish, and avocados are good for your heart,

your cholesterol. Avoid trans fats (hydrogenated oils), and fried foods, since these will raise your bad cholesterol.

- Whole grains are rich in fiber. Grains like brown rice, oats, corn, whole wheat, and quinoa are full of vitamins and antioxidants. Just avoid those that have been heavily processed.
- Watch the alcohol. More than 1 alcoholic drink per day, or 2 per day for men, can be bad for heart health. Keep drinking below these levels to keep your body happy.

All of these healthy choices can lead to better blood pressure, better cholesterol levels, weight loss, and better blood sugar control. They can also help you to feel Healthy fats from nuts, good, what's the draw back? American Heart Month is a great time to get started.

Question. Persuade. Refer. These are the three steps that anyone can learn to help prevent suicide, according to the QPR Institute. The QPR prevention training provided mission is to reduce suicidal behaviors and save lives by providing innovative, practical and proven suicide prevention training, cited the organization's website. "The signs of crisis are all around us. We believe that quality education empowers all people, regardless of their background, to make a positive difference in the life of someone they know." Southern Ute Community Actions Program (SUCAP) will be presenting the QPR training program to the Ignacio community at the end of the month.

Community plays a pivotal role in prevention efforts; bring professional training to anyone who might have the ability to influence actions and prevent suicide through greater awareness.

The upcoming suicide by SUCAP costs ten dollars per person, but funds are available for those who cannot afford the expense. The training will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 27 at Ignacio's ELHI Community Center.

Another immediate resource, available to anonymously report a young person in crisis, is SAFE2Tell, which can be contacted by text, phone or social media.


