Ute tribes fear Navajo Nation’s Colorado River ruling weakens U.S. government treaty obligations

Colorado tribes are worried that a U.S. Supreme Court ruling last month against the Navajo Nation in a Colorado River water rights case may narrow the federal government’s broad, historic responsibility to provide them with aid.

In Navajo Nation vs. Arizona Dept. of the Interior, the tribe was seeking to sue the federal government to require it to assess the tribe’s water rights along the Colorado River and help to create a plan to develop them for the 170,000 tribal members who live there.

Instead, in a 5-4 decision released June 22, the court ruled the federal government isn’t responsible for such actions, saying the treaties between the U.S. and the tribe didn’t explicitly require it.

“The 1868 treaty did impose a number of specific duties on the United States, but the treaty said nothing about any affirmative duty for the United States to secure water,” Justice Brett Kavanaugh wrote in the majority opinion.

Tribal leaders say the decision is a step toward diminishing the overall responsibilities of the federal government outlined in the treaties. That could impact how much the U.S. gov-

ernment is required to help with tribal projects related to other natural resources and climate resiliency work, said Daniel Cordalis, tribal partnership manager for the Colorado River Sustainability Campaign.

“What a permanent homeland for tribal members means now, it’s pretty vague,” said Cordalis, who is also a member of Navajo Nation. “Tribes might find it a lot harder to get the United States to help them and work with them on some of these projects, if they don’t have to threaten the power of a trust claim behind them.”

The Navajo Nation reservation is the largest in the U.S., spanning 16 million acres across parts of Arizona, New Mexico and Utah and bordering southwest Colorado.

A threat to treaties

The decision from the Supreme Court is somewhat in conflict with how the Biden administration has handled other tribal relations, said Peter Ortego, general counsel for the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe, which is in southwestern Colorado and northern New Mexico and neighbors the Navajo Nation in the Four Corners region.

“It looks like the federal government is respecting that trust responsibility and trying to do something positive,”

he said, “and now the courts have said they don’t have that trust responsibility.”

The opinion could change the way the federal government sees its responsibility to other tribes, Ortego said. The federal government recognizes 574 American Indian tribes and Alaska Native entities in the U.S.

“We shouldn’t be playing games with these things,” he said. “This was a permanent situation, the nation was at war and now they’re saying the treaties signed to get out of that war are not worth more than the paper and ink they’re written on.”

Leaders of the Southern Ute Tribe, which has a reservation in southern Colorado, said they would be working to enact legislation to ensure the trust responsibility is upheld.

The opinion “is reflective of this court’s continued assault on the trust responsibility that the federal government owes to tribes,” the Southern Ute Tribe wrote in a statement.

Tribes already felt their treaties weren’t respected and the decision takes that a step further, Ortego said.

“What happens if the treaties go away?” he said. “If (tribes) don’t feel they have the protections of those treaties, what options do they feel like they have?”

FIRE RESTRICTIONS

Southern Ute Indian Tribe, La Plata County enact Stage 1 fire restrictions

Fire restrictions help agencies and the community reduce fire risk and prevent fires during periods of high or extreme fire danger.

SOUTHERN UTE INDIAN TRIBE

Due to the current high temperatures, dry fuel conditions and occurrence of recent wildland fires, Stage 1 fire restrictions have been implemented for all trust lands throughout the Southern Ute Indian Reservation. Everyone on reservation lands is asked to be very cautious and use common sense with fire this time of year. Stage I Fire Restrictions prohibits acts for the general public, commercial operators and industrial oil and gas operators performing work on the Southern Ute Indian Reservation.

STAGE I
General Public
Prohibited acts:

1. OPEN BURNING. Burning of trash and/or yard waste is prohibited.
2. AGRICULTURAL BURNING. Burning of crop land, fields, rangeland, debris burning, slash piles, prescribed burning and weed burning are prohibited.
3. CAMPFIRES. Building, maintaining, or using a warming fire or campfire outside of officially designated or developed camp sites is prohibited. The

fire restrictions do not include charcoal fires (in suitable containers) for barbecues or fires for sweat ceremonies, however, such fires are not to be left unattended and are to be fully extinguished after use.

4. FIREWORKS. Possession, discharging or use of any type or fireworks is prohibited.

Commercial and Industrial restrictions can be obtained from the BIA Fire Office at 575 County Road 517 or by calling (970) 563-4571.

Drum earns top honors at National Native Media Awards

The Native American Journalists Association (NAJA) awarded The Southern Ute Drum a total of five media awards in its annual National Native Media Awards competition, including the prestigious honor of winning first-place for General Excellence and first-place for Best Digital Publication. The remaining three awards were won by individual staff members for excellence in photography. Winners were announced in a press release from NAJA on Thursday, July 6.

Newspaper Editor, Jeremy Wade Shockley took home a first -place win in the Best Photo of Native America category for his image of the Acoma Sky City Dancers performing the Corn Dance at Chimney Rock National Monument; competing in the “associate” categories, which are open to non-Native employees of tribal newspapers.

Reporter/Photographer Divine Windy Boy was also recognized for her photography, bringing home a third-place win for her feature “Powwow: Native nations reunite at Tingley” in the Best Feature Photo category during her first year working

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on staff as a reporter for the Southern Ute Drum.

Administrative Assistant Krista Richards rounded out the photography awards, earning Honorable Mention in the category of Best News Photo for her image of the Southern Ute Tribal Fair grease pole contest. “Receiving recognition from our peers in Indian Country is really special,” Shockley said. “As the editor of this publication I truly believe this reflects on the quality of work we do for the membership, these accolades are not just a win for the newspaper, but for the Tribe as a whole.”

The Southern Ute Drum competes in Professional and Associate Division I for newspapers with a print circulation under 5,000. Digital

excellence is a reflection of our newspaper’s website and social media presence. The Drum’s affiliation with NAJA goes back to the early 1990’s; the association’s mission is stated as – Empowering a unique network of members and journalists covering Indian Country. NAJA serves more than 900 members, including media professionals working in tribal, freelance, independent and mainstream news outlets, as well as academia and students covering Indigenous communities and representing tribal nations from across North America.

NAJA will recognize outstanding Indigenous journalism later this summer during the National Native Media Awards ceremony in Winnipeg, Canada.

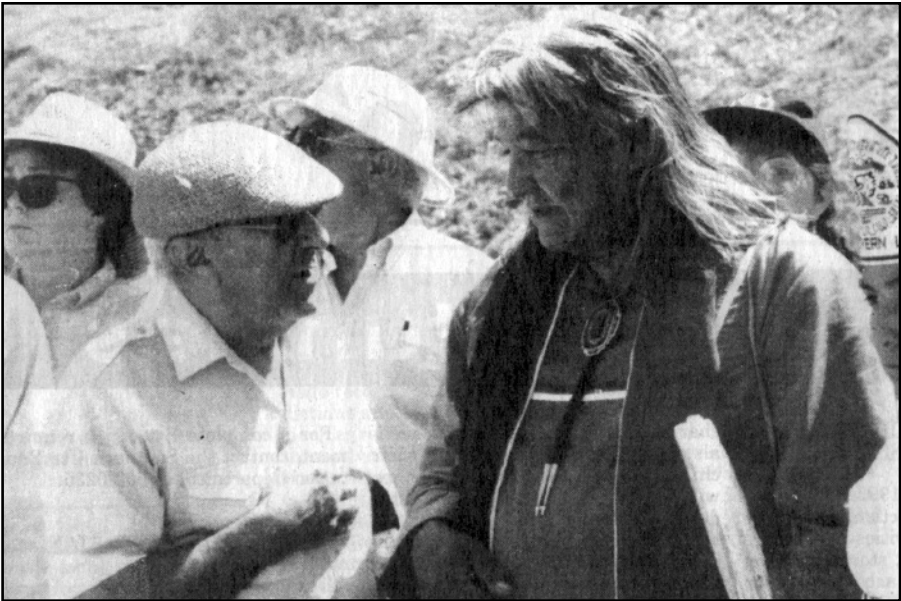

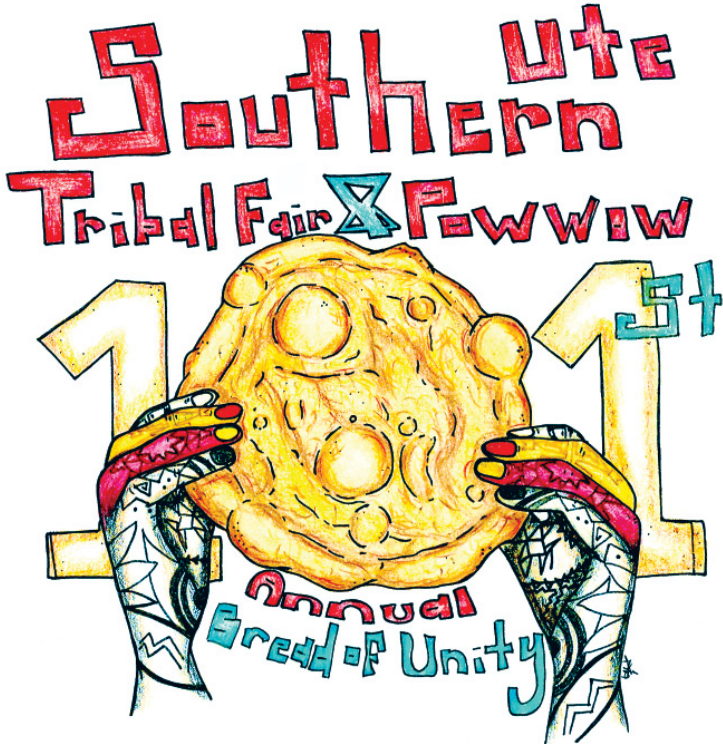

Summer Pasta Salad

Ingredients

- 16 oz whole wheat pasta (elbows, penne, rotini, etc.)
- 2 tomatoes (Roma or from your garden!), diced
- 1 medium cucumber, cut into bite-sized pieces
- 1 yellow or orange bell pepper, cut into bite sized pieces
- 1 cup black olives
- 2 green onions, sliced
- 4 oz Feta cheese crumbles
- Small handful fresh parsley, chopped
- Salt and pepper to taste

Dressing

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1 tablespoon Italian seasoning
- 1 tablespoon water

Directions

1. Cook pasta according to package directions.
2. Cut all vegetables as directed above.
3. In a large bowl, combine the vegetables (except parsley).
4. When pasta is done, rinse under cold water and place in refrigerator for 10 minutes.
5. Place all dressing ingredients in a bowl and whisk vigorously.
6. Combine cooled pasta with vegetable mixture, add Feta and fresh parsley.
7. Pour dressing over mixture, stir well to coat. Add salt and pepper to taste.
8. Serve or place in refrigerator for up to 5 days.

Some things to note: Whole grains provide fiber, feta provides protein, olives provide healthy fat.

BEE HEARD: The 4 Pillars of Health

Recently a friend asked me what the most important single thing was that she could do for her health. I told her that it would be impossible to choose just one thing! However, there is a model that helps us understand what is good for our health. This model is called “The 4 Pillars of Health”.

What are the four pillars of health?

- Behavioral Health
- Sleep
- Diet
- Exercise

It is impossible to choose just one component because they all affect the others.

Sleep quality, healthy diet, and some regular physical exercise are all fairly self-explanatory. Behavioral Health means mental health and avoiding substance use. Here are some examples of how they can negatively affect each other:

- If you get poor sleep, you may not feel like exercising
- If you are stressed, it may be hard to sleep
- If you drink or use substances, it may affect your mental health

On the other hand, the pillars can also positively affect each other:

- If you exercise, you

may sleep better

- If you sleep better, you may have a better mood
- If you eat a healthier diet, you may be able to exercise better

So, as you can see, the four pillars of health all affect each other. When my friend pushed me to choose, I said I think Behavioral Health is probably the most important, because as the saying goes, “There is no health without mental health.”

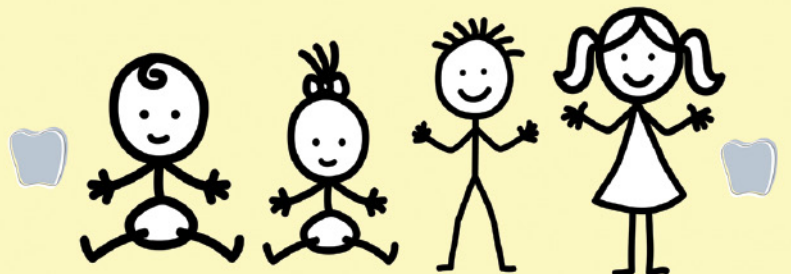

Sports physicals: Why are they needed?

It is mid-summer and while many kids are deep in forgetting school ever was or ever will be again, the start of fall school sports is only a few weeks away. In order to participate in school sports, all 50 states require a “pre-participation physical exam” – what most of us call a sports physical.

Many states have a specific form that is required and aligns with the national form put out by the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Academy of Family Physicians, and the American College of Sports Medicine. Colorado has a standard form it recommends and makes available on the Colorado High School Athletics Association website (linked below). It has a page for personal and family medical history, a four-question portion asking about depression symptoms, and a page for providers to complete with vital signs, exam findings, and a final determination about sports clearance.

While sports physicals can be completed in several settings, primary care providers encourage them to be done in their offices. Many young people between 10 and 18 years old only see a provider once a year for their sports physical form to be completed. If they are seen for that

The Ignacio School District is sad to see Lounge leave but is excited for her as she embarks on her next chapter of life. On behalf of ISD we thank her for all of her hard work and dedication to the job.

Up to \$15,000 is available to cover the artist's fees, materials, transportation and installation. Multiple artists may be selected and provided with a \$500 stipend to spec work prior to final design selection.

Project Goals/Concept Guidelines: The goal is for this artwork to create a welcoming gateway into the town of Mancos that supports the broadening of the definition of "the West" to be more culturally inclusive and representative of the Indigenous people living in the area historically and currently.

Round Up Grants are made possible by the generosity of La Plata Electric Association (LPEA) members, who choose to round up their electric bill each month to the next highest dollar. So far, approximately 16,986 LPEA members have donated \$59,771 to the Round Up Foundation in 2023. Each month \$5,000 in Unclaimed Capital Credits totaling \$60,000 annually is also allocated by the LPEA Board of Directors to support Educational Grants.

A percentage of Round Up Foundation funds is also distributed to community assistance programs each year. In 2023, the Round Up Foundation allocated \$12,442 to the Community Emergency Assistance Coalition and \$4,131 to the Pagosa Outreach Connection to provide families and individuals with emergency assistance funds.

Grants are available to registered 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations in La Plata and Archuleta counties and usually range from \$500 to \$5,000. Application forms are available at lpea.coop/grant-programs.

CO 172 Ignacio resurfacing

Staff report
COLO. DEPT. OF TRANSPORTATION

The Colorado Department of Transportation and contractor Oldcastle SW Group, Inc., will make surface, accessibility, safety and drainage improvements to a 16.7-mile section of CO Highway 172 through the town of Ignacio north to the junction of US 160 (locally known as Elmore’s Corner).

The project will include surface treatment of the entire stretch; several culvert upgrades; some new ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) ramps in downtown Ignacio and other traffic safety upgrades.

PROJECT BENEFITS

- The surface treatment project includes the following improvements:
- Culvert replacement in three locations prior to paving, to enhance highway and drainage infrastructure: at MP 11.59 and MP 14.23, both south of the airport (airport turn-off is at MP 18.9); and at MP 20, just north of the airport.
 - Florida River bridge resurfacing at MP 19.4 north of the airport, to maintain the bridge deck and driving surface.
 - Culvert repairs/upgrades at three additional locations, to enhance highway and drainage infrastructure.
 - Deep-patch repairs to the roadway in two locations, one just north of the airport (near MP 19), and one in downtown

- Ignacio, to improve the roadway and enhance safety for drivers.
- Asphalt resurfacing of the entire 16.7-mile stretch (two applications), to improve the roadway and enhance safety for drivers.
 - ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) ramps and concrete work in downtown Ignacio will enhance safety for pedestrians. Work will occur at the following intersection locations, in order of progression from south to north (approximately MP 8.5 to 9.3):
 - El Paso Road
 - Pine Street
 - Navajo Street
 - Empire Street
 - Ute Street
 - Pioneer Street
 - Lampert Street
 - Lakin Street
 - Ignacio Street
 - Browning Street

TRAFFIC IMPACTS

- Phase I Paving - July 24 through approximately late August
- Paving works zone extends from just south of the US 160 junction to just south/east of the airport.
- Single-lane, alternating traffic Monday - Friday; some Saturday work is possible.

The Colorado Department of Transportation and contractor Oldcastle SW Group, Inc., will begin the first phase of paving on CO 172 (an east-west highway) on the segment from just east of the Durango Airport (DRO) turn-off to just east of the US 160 junction at Elmore’s Corner (between red arrows on map).

Hickenlooper, Romney introduce seven-year extension of fish recovery programs

U.S. Senators John Hickenlooper and Mitt Romney recently introduced the Upper Colorado and San Juan River Basins Endangered Fish Recovery Programs Reauthorization Act. The bill extends federal support for the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program and San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Program for seven years, which, combined, protect four threatened and endangered native fish species in the Upper Colorado and San Juan River Basins. Senators Bennet, Lujan, and Heinrich joined as original cosponsors.

“Collaboration between Tribes, local communities, and state and federal leaders delivers results—reauthorizing these recovery programs is a no-brainer,” said Hickenlooper. “Our bill will bring certainty for water users, local stakeholders, program partners — and fish!”

“This legislation, which gives Utah the tools it needs to comply with complicated federal mandates, is a good model for successfully recovering endangered species,” said Senator Romney. “I’m proud to join my colleague from Colorado in reintroducing this bill, which will support Utah’s efforts to recover threatened and endangered fish species in the Upper Colorado and San Juan Rivers.”

The legislation builds on the success of Hickenlooper and Romney’s Upper Colorado and San Juan River Basins Recovery Act in the 117th Congress, which provided a one-year extension for the programs and was

passed into law with the annual budget last December.

“The Recovery Implementation Program is a model for how states, tribes, water users, and Congress can work together to protect our environment,” according to a statement from the Southern Ute Indian Tribe’s Council Affairs Office. “The fish recovery programs in the Upper Colorado and San Juan River Basins have proven to be successful and reauthorizing the program would help the fish species and their habitats continue to prosper. The programs provide compliance with the Endangered Species Act for approximately 2,500 federal, state, local and tribal water projects, including every Reclamation project upstream of Lake Powell. This is a critical investment in our environment and our future.”

The Upper Colorado and San Juan River Basin Endangered Fish Recovery Programs Reauthorization Act will:

- Extend the Bureau of Reclamation’s participation in the Upper Colorado and San Juan River Recovery Programs for seven years, providing certainty for Upper Basin water use and fulfilling the federal government’s trust responsibility to Tribes. Ensure continued Endangered Species Act compliance for 2,500 water projects spanning federal, Tribal, and non-federal jurisdiction, including every Bureau of Reclamation project upstream of Lake Powell. Authorize up to \$92 million for the Bureau of Reclamation to contrib-

ute annual cost shared funding for program implementation, continuing work to stock the threatened and endangered fish species, conduct research, manage habitat and river flows, combat nonnative species, and operate fish passages and hatcheries through fiscal year 2031.

- Add up \$50 million to the authorization ceiling for capital projects, which will fund infrastructure improvements essential to recovery of the endangered and threatened fish. Enable program partners to deploy their own commitments, enlisting the Upper Basin states, Tribes, and non-federal partners to provide their own contributions to meet shared species recovery goals.

The fish recovery programs are widely celebrated success stories in the Upper Colorado and San Juan River Basins. In November 2021, the Fish and Wildlife Service downlisted the humpback chub from “endangered” to “threatened” thanks to the recovery programs.

“The ESA can have a chilling effect on resource development, but the collaborative San Juan Recovery Implementation Program has allowed for both responsible water resource development and species protection since its creation in the 1990’s,” said Ute Mountain Ute Tribe Chairman Manuel Heart. “This long-term reauthorization bill is critical to keeping that dual benefit working effectively, and we strongly support Senator Hickenlooper introducing this bill, and we support its prompt enactment.”

La Plata County enacts Stage 1 fire restrictions

La Plata County Sheriff Sean Smith, who is also authorized by state statute as the fire warden of La Plata County, is acting on the recommendation of area fire chiefs and in accord with the Southern Ute Agency,

by enacting Stage 1 Fire Restrictions effective 6 a.m. Monday, July 10.

Fire restrictions help agencies and the community reduce fire risk and prevent fires during periods of high or extreme fire danger. Stage 1 fire restrictions prohibit the following acts in the unincorporated areas of La Plata County and upon all lands owned by La Plata County, excluding private lands in the Towns of Bayfield and Ignacio, the City of Durango or any Federal or Tribal lands:

Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire, coal or wood burning stove; any type of charcoal fueled broiler; open fire of any type in undeveloped areas EXCEPT THAT as long as not left unattended and fully extinguished after use, the use of charcoal or gas barbe-

cue grills at private residences or fires in a designated campground or inside established metal fire rings with a grate cover on private property are not prohibited.

Open burning, burn barrels and agricultural burning except by agricultural producers as provided for in C.R.S. §30-15-401(n.5) (III) and defined in C.R.S. §35-28-104(11); provided however, that such agricultural burning is permitted only with 24 hours prior notification to the appropriate fire chief or the Sheriff of La Plata County; and The use of floating sky lanterns, fire balloons or acetylene balloons are always prohibited in La Plata County.

A “simple ask”

The case began in 2003 when the Navajo Nation sued the federal government, saying it had violated its trust agreement from an 1869 treaty to establish a “permanent home” by not protecting their nation’s water rights.

That case bounced around lower courts for years until it ended up in front of the U.S. Supreme Court. The case was argued in March.

Colorado joined Arizona, Nevada and parts of California in asking the court to rule against the Navajo Nation, arguing agreement with the tribe would under-

mine existing agreements for the Colorado River.

If the Navajo Nation wants access to water from the lower Colorado River now, Congress must act or the tribe needs to ask the Supreme Court to reopen a prior case that allocated water between states, said attorney Rita McGuire, who represented southwestern states that opposed the tribe, according to The Associated Press.

Justices John Roberts, Clarence Thomas, Samuel Alito and Amy Barrett joined the majority opinion and Thomas also wrote a concurring opinion. Justice Neil Gorsuch wrote the dissenting opinion, which

was signed by Justices Sonia Sotomayor, Elena Kagan and Ketanji Jackson.

Gorsuch argued that the court was rejecting a request the Navajo Nation never made.

“The Navajo have a simple ask: They want the United States to identify the water rights it holds for them. And if the United States has misappropriated the Navajo’s water rights, the Tribe asks it to formulate a plan to stop doing so prospectively,” he wrote.

The Navajo Nation can still conduct their own assessments of their water rights, but without the resources and help from the federal government.

Inherent Relationships and the Rights of Nature

Staff report

INDIGENOUS ENVIRONMENTAL NETWORK

Introduction

This brief paper examines some of the core issues and frameworks that shape the concept of Inherent Relationships with the Rights of Nature. The purpose is to provide some thinking on how these two distinct ideas are indeed distinct, coming from Indigenous and non-Indigenous frameworks, and how being conscious of this can help in advancing both in a way that works in tandem with one another. It is by no means exhaustive, but only seeks to raise some questions and thoughts that might be useful for further discussion amongst those engaged in work in these areas.

Inherent Relationships

Indigenous peoples have existed since time immemorial and have traditional Indigenous knowledge that informs Indigenous spiritual, social, and political frameworks that are intrinsically tied to lands, sky and waters and all upon and within them. This complex set of inter-relationships places Indigenous peoples in the midst of inherent relationships that give rise to Indigenous sovereignty. The very existence and identity of Indigenous entities have an inseverable connection with these inherent relationships. They continue to exist even when many of those in the specific Indigenous entity are not aware of them. Placing Indigenous peoples and entities in a context separate from these inherent relationships is a form of genocide, as it severs these inherent relationships from the people.

When treaties are closely examined, the Indigenous voice is for the most part lost in the non-Indigenous legalistic language. Yet there is overwhelming evidence in the Indigenous nation respective oral histories that the treaties were understood to be the establishment of equitable relations with the Europeans, while maintaining their inherent relationships. Over time this understanding has been buried, only preserved in off reservation hunting, fishing, gathering, and sacred site access and preservation.

Customary rights and customary law are aspects of the deeper Indigenous legal systems recognized by the nation-states in their domestic laws. The preservation and assertion of these customary rights

and laws exist in the nation-state framework and are subject to their legal/political whims. It is a tenuous continuation of the inherent relationships that make the people of the land who they are. It is something unique to Indigenous peoples and nations. There can be no recognition of the human rights of Indigenous peoples separate from these inherent relationships, and the obligations of Indigenous peoples to protect them from human greed and cupidity. That makes the people of the land who they are and is part of Indigenous identity.

Rights of Nature

The Rights of Nature movement seeks to extend the Eurocentric framework of rights accrued to individuals, to aspects of the natural world. Eurocentric frameworks are rooted in the notion that the fundamental unit of society is the individual, and that societal structures, to remain viable and coherent, need some forms of protections and restrictions for the individuals in that society. Rights are created to ensure that the societal entity maintains these protections and restrictions on itself and its members. Although often abused and challenged, the legal enforceability of these rights can serve as a form of protection and preservation for what are termed individual liberties. To allow for collective entities like corporations and trusts, a legal fiction has been created to allow them to assert legal personality, as if they were an individual. The Rights of Nature movement seeks to extend that legal personality legal fiction to aspects of lands and waters such as rivers, forests, and discrete ecosystems. It is what is called nature as separate from humans with its own legal standing.

At first glance, this seems very appealing to those interested in protecting the environment. It can contribute to impeding harmful developments like fracking, hazardous waste storage, extractive mining and drilling, and similar type projects. It is only when one seeks to extend the ramifications of such a legal regime, do the flaws become apparent in the context of Indigenous people's inherent relationships. The Rights of Nature as it is currently being undertaken, unconsciously undermines the inherent relationships that form the basis of Indigenous peoples realities.

When Indigenous peoples speak of spiritual beings, we

speak of them as existing in their own right and are often manifestations of the natural world of which we are an intrinsic part. Thunder beings, spirits of the trees, rivers, rocks, and animal nations are all included. So, when we speak of them being protected from harm, a Eurocentric way of doing that is to accrue rights to these entities. Unfortunately, a rights-based framework is contingent upon those rights being recognized in the nation-state legal system and applied in a cohesive way. For example, in the United States, it is not cohesive to have the rights of a river in one state be recognized but not in another state, or even another nation-state in which it also flows. How can they be protected in a general sense without defining what the protection consists of and who has legal standing to advocate on its behalf?

Furthermore, by designating aspects of the natural world as having rights in and of itself, severs the recognition of the inherent relationships tied to Indigenous peoples. It is a form of extinguishment, termination, and genocide however unintentional. The Rights of Nature in this context can therefore only exist in a non-Indigenous context through the human centric connection with lands, sky and waters.

Inherent Relationship Jurisprudence

At present there is an evolving jurisprudence that has various names but is essentially linked by some common principles. These include Rights of Nature, Rights of Mother Earth, Earthlaw, Wild Law, Earth Jurisprudence, etc. All of the adherents draw ideas and inspiration from Indigenous peoples and many are important allies to Indigenous peoples, and in many instances are Indigenous peoples. The common theme is that they are framed around the notion of rights, and that they all exist within the non-Indigenous framework of law and society. In the present, it would be extremely difficult to assert a jurisprudence exclusively within an Indigenous peoples framework that would be enforceable. It is possible however, to develop a jurisprudence that better bridges an Indigenous framework with the non-Indigenous legal system. This could be done by extending the human rights of Indigenous peoples to be inclusive of these inherent re-

Two-day work session focused on traditional Indigenous knowledge

INDIGENOUS ENVIRONMENTAL NETWORK

The Indigenous Environmental Network (IEN) and the Earth Law Center (ELC) hosted a two-day working session on the following topics. The working session was intended to provide background to the concept of Inherent Relationships Jurisprudence (IRJ) as a legal philosophy arising from traditional Indigenous knowledge and how it might be used by Indigenous nations, organizations, etc. to advocate for.

The concept is in its early days of development, and we do not claim ownership of it. How it evolves and how it can be utilized will be entirely at the discretion of those choosing to adapt it. For this reason, we are hosting a series of two-day working sessions and inviting people to attend that have some background in issues relating to customary rights, Indigenous legal systems, nation-state laws impacting upon Indigenous nations, jurisdictional authority, treaty reserved rights, traditional Indigenous knowledge and related issues.

The project on this partnership between IEN and ELC has two primary goals



for the year. The first is to create a working group of approximately ten or so people to further develop the concept of Inherent Relationships Jurisprudence and how it might be utilized and implemented as something that is legally enforceable. The second is to work with ten nations, communities, etc. that want to incorporate IRJ into their internal structure, so as to use externally as an advocacy framework. IEN and ELC would support these ten volunteers in whatever way they deem necessary to do this.

After one year, an assessment will be done, and what comes out of the working group and the ten volunteers will be shared more widely, and a determination will be made as to how to further this work. It needs to also be very clear that we are also working on an ethical protocol for the protection and use of traditional Indigenous knowledge for non-profits and NGOs and all such knowledge will be controlled as to its use by those that contribute it.

Our focus is not on a rights-based framework, and therefore we are trying to establish IRJ to sit beside Rights of Nature/Rights of Mother Earth, with the same status, but coming from different places legally and philosophically.

Day one further explained and explored the concept of IRJ as we understand it at this stage, how it relates to but is distinct from the Rights of Nature/Rights of Mother Earth and listened to the participants on their perspectives on all of this. Day two was focused on how what arose in day one can be used to advance the concept into something that can be applied to various issues relating to the protection of customary rights, treaty reserved rights, protecting sacred sites, and uplifting these inherent responsibilities into a legal standard relating to human rights and identity.

The sessions were held at Fort Lewis College, July 7-8 in Durango, Colo.

lationships. There are literally decades of advocacy for the human rights of Indigenous peoples, and the concomitant testimony relating to traditional Indigenous knowledge. The elements of the jurisprudence are already existing. An Inherent Relationship Jurisprudence, along with Indigenous legal/political entities asserting and advocating for them through already existing customary rights/law avenues, has the added benefit of easily asserting legal standing in the non-Indigenous legal system.

The issue of legal standing is significant in relation to the Rights of Nature. In the event that an entity like the Mississippi River is said to have legal personality, how is it determined who can speak for it and determine that its rights have been violated? What remedies can arise from any action defending its rights? What entity would have jurisdiction to hear such an assertion? What laws would need to be changed to accommodate for such a designation? For non-Indigenous advocates these questions present, in my view, almost insurmountable obstacles. For Indigenous peoples they do not. If Indian nations assert an inherent relationship, and if inherent relationships were tied to Indigenous customary rights and laws and recognized as integral to the Indian nation identity and existence, then legal standing is not an issue, and the jurisdictional forums are fair-

ly clear. If non-Indigenous wish to make a strong case for protecting lands and waters, the strongest case to be made is to recognize and support Indigenous nations in asserting Inherent Relationship Jurisprudence as a fundamental human right inseverably linked to Indigenous peoples.

Conclusion

The Rights of Nature movement is transformative for creating nation-state legal frameworks that go beyond merely conservation. In saying that, they are also dependent on nation-states to make them work. An oft-cited example is the Wanganui River legal personality recognition in New Zealand. It came about as part of a Treaty of Waitangi Settlement with the Iwi and hapu of the Wanganui River. The irony in this is that while the New Zealand government is party to an innovative way to include Iwi and hapu in river management, it does not recognize the inherent legal personality of the very same iwi and hapu. It recognizes what it chooses to recognize as delegated authority from the Crown rather than from any recognition of inherent relationships. This is subtle but significant.

The only way that the Rights of Nature can have more than symbolic significance is for the overarching nation-state to carve out distinct legal niches. In other

words, perhaps the rights of an ecosystem that already has some distinct protection like a national park might be ascertained to have rights that are enforceable, but such designation would necessitate specific laws designating who has standing, the scope of what can be advocated for, remedies for violations, etc.

On the other hand, Inherent Relationship advocacy need not be so niche oriented. It can be extended to already recognized off reservation hunting, fishing, gathering, and sacred site access and protection, and increased protections of the customary rights and laws associated with them. It can also overcome limitations on tribal authority based upon the Montana decision rule in the United States, as an Inherent Relationship Jurisprudence is linked to the integrity of the tribe itself. In addition, it is possible that already existing human rights instruments that have been created to protect Indigenous Peoples can be expanded upon to include Inherent Relationships as integral to Indigenous Peoples and are inseverable. This could also have the serendipitous impact upon efforts to subvert terms like Indigenous knowledge and traditional knowledge into a property framework to commodify what is called nature and this knowledge. The advancement of Inherent Relationship Jurisprudence will serve to protect and strengthen Indigenous sovereignty.

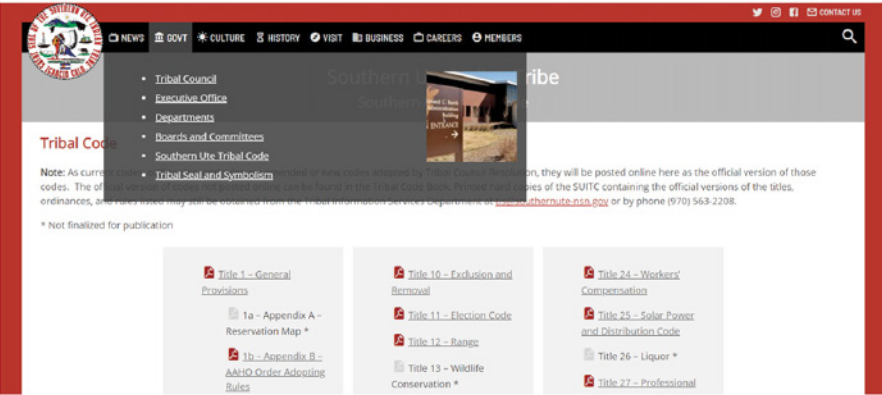

Servicing guests during Bingo games including selling additional special games and pull tabs, instructing customers in Bingo play, calling Bingo games, beverage service and other duties promoting guest satisfaction and play. Verifying winning Bingo cards and making payouts accordingly.

*Bingo Coordinator (Full-time)

Directs and oversees the day-to-day activities of the Bingo Department. Has the oversight in staffing, training, scheduling, reward and disciplining employees, addressing complaints, and resolving problems/concerns; and to ensure high quality customer service. Ensure compliance with the Casino’s policies & procedures and applicable Gaming regulations. Maintain a high standard of guest service within the Bingo Department and actively promotes positive customer and employee relations by ensuring that excellent customer service is continually provided. Reports to the Casino General Manager.

*Café Cashier (Shinning Mountain Cashier) (Full-time)

Providing friendly and courteous service to all guests in a fast-paced work environment. Taking guests food orders, accurately totaling food and beverage purchases and collecting payments. Assists in preparing and serving all foods necessary for the Cafe kitchen. Prepares ala carte food products from the hot food line in the front area of the Café. Will balance the register at end of the shift, with proper report of discrepancies and complete paperwork.

*Career Development Coordinator (Full-time)

Will provide career and educational guidance to the Casino Southern Ute Indian Tribe (SUIT) employees through career skills training, mentorship and to promote management opportunities. Career development, coordination and presentation of training and development programs for all SUIT employees. Will manage and actively recruit new candidates for the CDP program. Works in conjunction with the Department Director/Managers to promote career advancement.

*Casino Housekeeping Staff (Full-time)

Cleaning all public areas including Casino floor, public restrooms, restaurant, lobby, offices, and employee break rooms.

*Catering Sales Associate (Full-time)

Will be the focal point in establishing and maintaining working relationships with our customers. To increase catering sales revenues and contribute to slot revenue.

*Count Team Staff (Full-time)

Retrieves, counts, and calculates the daily revenue produced by the Gaming Revenue Departments. Pulls the containers and counts or verifies the funds according to the regulatory requirements and procedures set by the Southern Ute Division of Gaming’s Internal Control Minimum Procedures and the Sky Ute Casino Resort.

*Deep Cleaning Staff (Full-time)

Cleanliness of the entire Kitchen as instructed by the Facilities Manager and/or Supervisor. Will clean Food and Beverage facilities and equipment.

*Facilities Staff (Full-Time)

Operation of equipment, environmental condition and appearance of the facility and grounds. Responsible for the cleanliness, maintenance and repair of the facility, equipment, and building. Assists in repair and maintenance of equipment within the facility. Cleanliness of kitchen areas and equipment, facility equipment, carpets, building and grounds. Shuttles Hotel guests to and from the airport as needed.

*Facilities Supervisor (Full-time)

Reports to the Facilities Manager and was established for the purpose/s of supervising individual shifts to include facility and deep cleaning staff within the maintenance department. Coordinating all repair and alterations of the property including the exterior and grounds and to work in conjunction with facility technicians.

*Facilities Tech (Full-time)

Electrical and mechanical functions, operations of equipment, environmental controls and conditions, and the structural integrity and appearance of the facility and grounds. Works as part of a team to ensure smooth operations of the facility, equipment and building by providing maintenance support, troubleshooting and repair, preventative maintenance on commercial heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems.

*Fine Dining Server (Full-time)

Provide an exceptional fine dining experience by delivering first class guest service of food and beverages to include: taking the order and delivering food and beverage items. Handle tasks in a friendly, courteous, helpful, timely, and professional manner, resulting in a high level of guest satisfaction.

*Front Desk Staff (Full-time)

Providing quality guest services that include reservations, registration and check-out, PBX operations, mail, and message service for hotel guests. Responds to telephone and in person inquiries regarding reservations, hotel information and guest concerns. Assistance with guests include but is not limited to luggage assistance, directions/maps, driving guests to/from the airport.

*Housekeeping Supervisor (Full-time)

The Housekeeping Supervisor will act in the leadership and training capacity. The Supervisor will direct employees and help them to complete their tasks and goals defined by the Housekeeping Manager. *Lead Facilities Technician HVAC (Full-time)

Electrical and mechanical functions, operation of equipment, environmental controls and conditions, and the structural integrity and appearance of the facility and grounds. Works as the lead of a team to ensure smooth operations of the facility, equipment, and building; by providing maintenance support, troubleshooting and repair, preventative maintenance on commercial heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems including boilers, AHU’s, hot and chilled water distribution systems, circulation pumps, cooling towers, walk-in coolers, and freezers. Reports to the Director of Facilities while sharing the responsibility to train and lead activities of departmental employees; technicians, shift supervisors, and facilities staff in appropriate Service Standards and Facility operations/maintenance.

*Line Cook (Full-time)

Works under direct supervision of the Lead Cook. Preparation of the menu and accountable for consistency of standardized recipes, presentation, food quality and freshness.

*Players Club Representative (Full-time)

Performs all administrative functions of a Players Club Representative such as: signing up new members, player’s account maintenance, answer player club and general property questions, administering redemption, complimentary and access rewards, and benefits to qualified players club members. Maintain the highest standard of guest service, problem resolution and confidentiality. Develops and creates a long-lasting experience for all Club Card members.

*Property Shift Manager (Full-time)

Key License coverage for the Casino gaming area, providing leadership and oversight in the

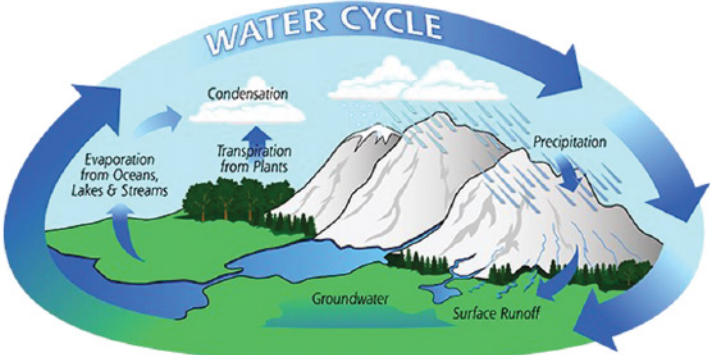
