Tribe seeking feedback on the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy

In November of 2022 Southern Ute Economic Development began the process of updating the Tribe's Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy or CEDS for short. This is the first update to the Tribe's original CEDS that was developed in 2018. This update builds upon the work of the original, while incorporating new data and introducing new concepts to address the needs of the Tribe in a post COVID-19 pandemic economic environment.

WHAT IS A CEDS?

A CEDS is a strategy-driven plan for regional economic development designed to build capacity and guide the economic prosperity and resiliency of a specific area or region. The Tribe's CEDS identifies strategies to enhance and improve the economic environment of the Southern Ute Indian Reservation. A



typical CEDS would serve as a guide to the Tribe's economic development efforts for the next five years. The US Economic Development Agency (EDA) has asked that the Tribe limit the scope of this CEDS update to a two-year window of 2023-2025. This request is being made to help the EDA get all tribes on the same five-year rotation for future CEDS updates starting in 2025. Having an active CEDS that has been approved by the EDA improves the Tribe's eligibility for various federal grants. This update to the CEDS is the result of an extensive strategic planning process that engaged Southern Ute tribal members, tribal staff, and regional partners to conduct research,

interviews, and provide input. This process was led by a 16-member stakeholder committee known as the CEDS Committee that consisted of Economic Development staff along with representatives from Tribal Council, tribal departments, and tribal business entities. The CEDS Committee held a number of strategy sessions over the course of several months during which five strategic priorities were identified and developed.

Those five priorities are:

- Improve the availability of diverse housing options.
- Expand high-speed broadband connectivity.
- Increase commercial infrastructure and community amenities.
- Improve tribal economic development capacity and ability to leverage underutilized resources.
- Enhance opportunities for business creation.

Bear Dance Fire burn area trail reopening

On June 3, 2022, the Bear Dance Fire ignited within Tribal Trust land, resulting in the burning of 89 acres north of the Bear Dance grounds and along the Los Pinos River. In the aftermath of the fire, the Environmental Programs Division (EPD) identified debris, including hazardous material, present on the ground in areas parallel to Ute Road. The presence of these hazardous materials raised concerns about public health and environmental integrity. Out of an abundance of caution, Tribal

Council closed the Bear Dance Fire burn area, including the hiking trail along the Los Pinos River.

The EPD and various environmental professionals have conducted air, soil, and water sampling of the debris area and determined that there is currently minimal risk to human health and the environment from the material. With a commitment to safety and caution, the Tribe wishes to remove these surface materials and remediate this important area. Remediation will commence in 2024 and consist of debris pile removal and capping of any remaining material in place.

With the assurance that

the potential risks are low, Tribal Council has made the informed decision to reopen access to the hiking trail and the Los Pinos River within the burn area. The debris piles will remain closed to the public and all signage posted must be abided by in the affected zone.

The area will undergo a temporary closure during the restoration process. Upon the conclusion of these restorative activities, the area will be reopened. Sixteen bands and musicians from a variety of genres highlight the 27th annual Four Corners Folk Festival, which returns to Reservoir Hill in Pagosa Springs, Colo., Sept. 1-3. Headliners include folk-rock icon Bruce Cockburn, Bluegrass Hall of Famer Peter Rowan, award-winning indie-rocker Amythyst Kiah and hip-hop/bluegrass innovators Gangstagrass.

"We are excited to welcome back festivarians to Reservoir Hill for the Four Corners Folk Festival," said KSUT Executive Director Tami Graham. "The

lineup reflects both the festival's long history and the quality of our diverse on-air programming that our listeners appreciate."

While still maintaining deep acoustic music traditions, the 2023 Four Corners Folk Festival lineup reflects the music heard on the KSUT Music Blend by including artists in rock, Americana, country, bluegrass, folk, Native American and other genres.

"Part of KSUT's mission is music discovery," said KSUT Development Director and Music Director, Chris Aaland, who serves as the talent buyer for the festival. "Our lineup includes core artists like

Bruce Cockburn and Peter Rowan alongside up-and-coming acts like Gangstagrass and The Sweet Lillies.

"We are also proud of our roots as one of the nation's oldest tribal radio stations, and we're committed to presenting award-winning indigenous performers in a variety of genres," he said. Ed Kabotie is an acclaimed reggae and folk singer and multi-instrumentalist of Te-wa and Hopi descent.

NAJA votes to change the name of the organization to the Indigenous Journalists Association

Change to be inclusive of Indigenous journalists

Members of the Native American Journalists Association (NAJA) voted to change the organization's name and elected the 2023-2024 Board of Directors during the 2023 National Native Media Conference held this week in Winnipeg, Canada. By a vote of 89-55, or nearly 62 percent, the membership voted to change the name to the Indigenous Journalists Association (IJA), unveiling the new name and logo during the NAJA Membership Luncheon.

"It's so inspiring to see Indigenous journalists around the world asserting themselves in newsrooms and taking their place as the rightful storytellers of their own narratives. It's long overdue, and we're so proud and excited to be a part of that movement," said NAJA/IJA President Graham Lee Brewer. "Connecting with our brothers and sisters across the globe, from Canada to New Zealand, has made it clear that as Indigenous peoples the struggles we face in this industry are universal."

The group began in 1983 when several Native Ameri-

can journalists met to form the Native American Press Association. In 1990, the group changed its name to NAJA to expand support for Native voices across all media platforms and ensure accurate and contextual reporting about Native communities.

"Despite the colonial framework that has warped our histories and shapes the stories told about us today or the challenges of working within structures that weren't designed for us to thrive, we see Indigenous journalists at every level doing the important work of representing their people. We live in a time when it is possible to connect and create deep, meaningful relationships with Indigenous journalists no matter where they are, and we look forward to helping them find each other to share their knowledge and support," Brewer said.

NAJA/IJA recognizes Indigenous peoples as distinct groups based on tradition and culture. In this spirit, NAJA/IJA educates and unifies its membership through journalism programs that promote diversity and defends challenges to free press, speech, and expression. The group is committed to increasing the representation of Indigenous journalists in mainstream media and encourages mainstream and Indigenous media to attain the highest standards of professionalism, ethics, and responsibility.

The Indigenous Journalists Association (IJA) board of directors elected its first executive committee for 2023-2024 during a meeting, Thursday, Aug. 17. Christine Trudeau, Jour-

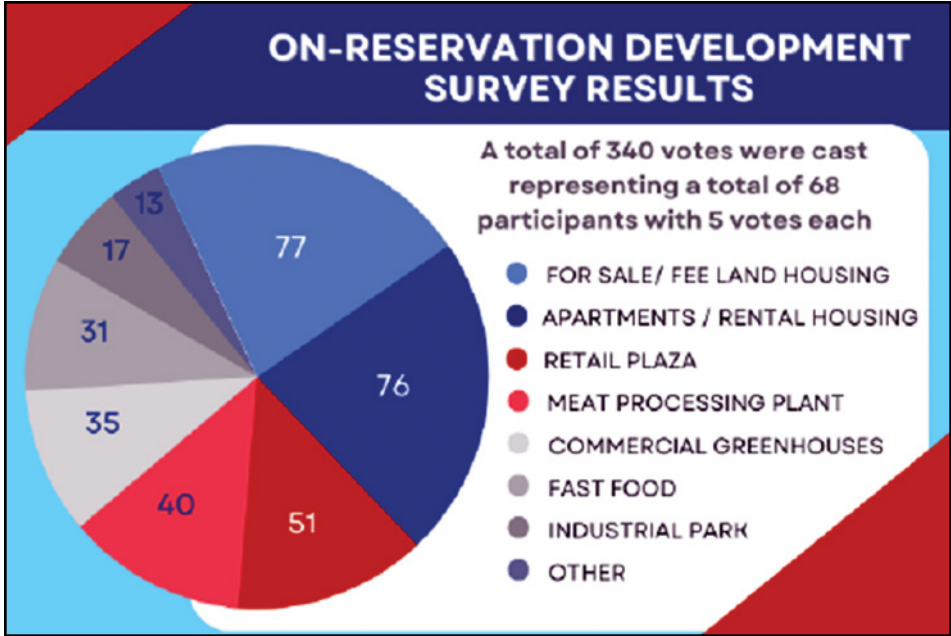

Each of these priorities has been organized into a one-page roadmap within the CEDS that outlines the desired outcome, goals, action items, and performance measures linked to each strategy.

A survey conducted at the General Meeting on July 13th provided confirmation that the priorities developed by the CEDS Committee were on the right track. The survey had participants vote on what types of on-reservation development should be prioritized to best improve quality of life and enhance the tribal economy. The results of that survey showed tribal members strongly favor prioritizing housing de-

velopment on the Reservation, with a slight edge to fee-land for sale homes followed by apartments for tribal employees and community workforce.

This aligns directly with CEDS Priority #1. Development of a retail plaza was the next highest vote – highlighting the desire for increased commercial infrastructure and amenities aligning with CEDS Priority #3. A meat processing plant and commercial greenhouses were next up in the vote tally, both of which align with food sovereignty goals and objectives contained within CEDS Priority #4.

The survey helped pro-

vide meaningful feedback and data to support the CEDS plan. Now Economic Development would like to get feedback and comments on the plan itself. The full version of the updated CEDS plan for 2023-2025 is now available on the Tribe's Economic Development website at <https://www.southernute-nsn.gov/eco-dev/>.

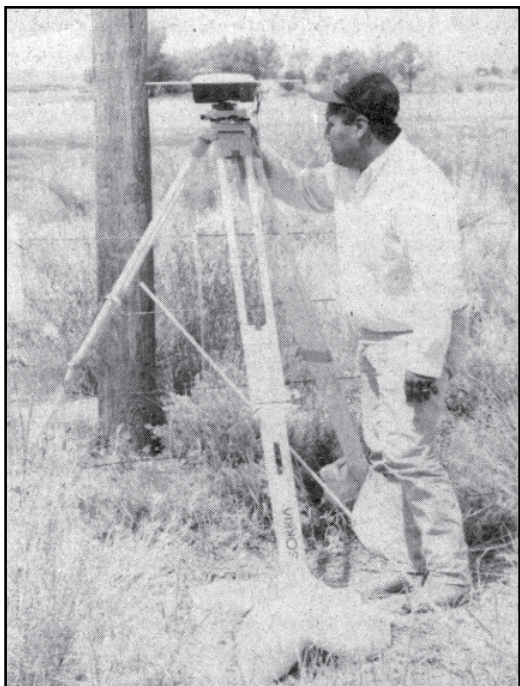

Overnight oats make a great back to school breakfast!

Packed with healthy long-lasting carbohydrates, protein, and fruit, this is ideal for a quick breakfast.

Because this is made the night before, no rushing around the kitchen in the morning.

This basic recipe can be easily adapted to fit the taste preferences of everyone in the family. You will need a small mason jar or a container with a tight-fitting lid.

Basic overnight oat

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup rolled oats (uncooked/not instant)
- 1/2 cup unsweetened milk of choice (cow, almond, soy, etc.)
- 1/4 cup plain Greek yogurt
- 0-1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 0-1 tablespoons sweetener (honey, pure maple syrup or 1/2 -1 teaspoon stevia)
- 0-2 tablespoons ground flaxseed or chia seeds

These ingredients can easily be adapted/changed to suit your taste!

A few more ideas...

Blueberry overnight oats

Start with basic overnight oats and add:
1/4 cup blueberries*

Banana nut overnight oats

Start with basic overnight oats and add:
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 banana, sliced*
2 tablespoons walnuts*

Peanut butter and jelly overnight oats

Start with basic overnight oats and add:
1 tablespoon strawberry jam
1-2 tablespoons smooth peanut butter
1/4 cup strawberries, sliced*
1 tablespoon peanuts, crushed*

Place all ingredients in a jar and mix well. Refrigerate overnight. Stir and enjoy! Eat within 3-5 days.

BEE HEARD: What is a peer recovery coach?

Aug. 31 is International Overdose Awareness Day

August 31st is International Overdose Awareness Day, the world's largest effort to bring stigma-free attention to those who have died from overdose as well as acknowledging family and friends who are intimately affected by the loss.

This year's theme is "Recognizing those people who go unseen." In light of this, Southern Ute Behavioral Health would like to share some information with the tribal membership and the community about Peer Recovery coaching: what a Peer Recovery Coach is and the roles and responsibilities they have.

What is a Peer Recovery Coach?

As the name suggests, a Peer Recovery Coach (PRC) is a companion through the recovery process. An important aspect of having a PRC by one's side is that they are an equal: unlike working with a therapist, there is a reduced power differential between individuals.

A PRC plays numerous roles, beginning with working as a connector to link recovering people to the recovery community and available resources. In fact, you might call them a resource broker. A PRC knows how to navigate the recovery system so they can connect the person in recovery with the fellow community and other support systems.

They help to establish a support network. They serve as a personal guide and mentor to help manage personal and family recovery by mobilizing volunteer resources in the recovery community.

Sounds great, doesn't it? It's important to mention a few things a PRC is not: a sponsor, a counselor, a nurse/doctor, or a lawyer. On that last note, however, PRCs do advocate for people in recovery and the broader recovery community. They can assist with protecting rights and act as a representative when requested.

What can a Peer Recovery Coach do?

Having lived experience of going through recovery themselves, PRCs believe strongly in the possibilities for change. They can spot patterns and behaviors. Having walked a similar path, they can offer feedback on people's lifestyle, choices, and possibilities for increased wellness.

While they do not solve problems for others, they can assist with problem solving and, in this way, encourage genuine hope and optimism.

A PRC is a non-judgmental, loyal motivator and cheerleader, encouraging and motivating as an ally and confidante, celebrating successes and victories large and small. A key here is active listening in a stable and consistent way. Trust is integral to the path and that means total honesty without sugar-coating. People on the

road to recovery need information that is appropriate to each step and stage of the recovery process.

To put it succinctly, a PRC is someone who accepts your past, supports your present, and encourages your future.

Here's to your good health!

La Plata County resident with West Nile virus dies

Residents reminded to avoid mosquito exposure

A La Plata County resident with West Nile virus, a mosquito-borne illness, died recently. This marks the fifth West Nile virus case in the San Juan Basin Public Health (SJBPH) jurisdiction. SJBPH urges residents and visitors to take precautions to protect themselves and their families.

West Nile virus (WNV) is carried by mosquitoes and can be passed on to humans through bites from an infected mosquito. Those aged 60 and older and those with certain medical conditions are at greater risk for serious illness.

Most people infected with mosquito-borne viruses do not get sick or have mild symptoms. For those who have symptoms, the time between the mosquito bite and the start of symptoms can be from two to 14 days. In rare cases, the virus can cause a serious brain infection such as meningitis or encephalitis.

These infections begin suddenly with high fever and headache and may progress to stiff neck, disorientation, tremors, and coma. Severe infections can result in



permanent brain damage or death. Most deaths occur in people over 50 years of age. There is no treatment for the virus other than supportive care, and there is no vaccine to prevent it. If you think you or a family member is sick with West Nile virus, consult a health care provider.

To protect yourself:

- Use insect repellents when you go outdoors. Repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or para-menthane-diol products provide the best protection. For more information about insect repellents visit the EPA's information webpage. Always follow label instructions.
- Limit outdoor activities at dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most active.
- Wear long pants, long-sleeved shirts, and socks in areas where

mosquitoes are active. Spray clothes with insect repellent for extra protection.

To mosquito-proof your home:

- Empty water from tires, cans, flowerpots, clogged gutters, rain barrels, birdbaths, toys, and puddles at least once every week.
- Install or repair screens on windows and doors.

Current and historic human case data for West Nile virus is also available on CDPHE's website, which is updated at least weekly during mosquito season.

Red flags of romance

There's a first time for everything and that includes love. The first time they walk home with you. The first time they call you on the phone or ask if you want a ride home on their motorcycle. There's a first time you put your arms around them to hold on for dear life and when they go faster you hold on tighter. It's all those firsts that can sometimes lead you to love ... or it can lead you to an uncomfortable and unpredictable situation.

NAVIGATING NEW RELATIONSHIPS

Understanding types of love, knowing how to identify the red flags of romance and taking a serious approach are good measures to take when navigating a new relationship.

Romance & types of love

Romance can be defined as the feelings of excitement and mystery associated with love; and to make things a little more interesting, there are eight types of love:

- Agape (love for everyone) Love of mankind or unselfish concern for the welfare of others.
- Philautia (self-love) - love that many have said is required before truly being able to love another.
- Storge (family love) love of parents for their children - strongly linked to long term memories.
- Philia (deep friendship) respectful love of friends and equals.
- Ludus (playful love) flirtatious, it's not serious, light-hearted.
- Eros (sexual passion) stirs the body and soul that burns hot but over-time fades or can turn into other types of love.
- Pragma (enduring love) love that builds over time with commitment and hard work.
- Mania (obsessive love) occurs when there is an imbalance in the relationship filled with insecurity and jealousy - at times it can be scary.

Red flags can apply to all relationships

Whether or not you are developing a healthy or toxic relationship with someone at work, at school, at the bar or online, there are "red flags" that are clear warning signs that something isn't right. However, all too often these signs are overlooked when an unsuspecting victim gives the benefit of the doubt to an undeserving perpetrator.

Key indicators or "red flags" can include the following seemingly harmless behaviors.

lowing seemingly harmless behaviors.

Moving Too Fast: When a potential friend or lover wants to move too fast in the relationship, they may start to demand more of you and your time. Victim survivors can mitigate abuse before it happens by recognizing that a new partner wants a commitment way too soon. They may:

- Pressure you to have sex before you are ready.
- Shower you with compliments or seemingly put you on a pedestal.
- Act extremely jealous or possessive of you.

Overprotective | Over reactive:

Questionable behaviors may occur when your partner is being overly protective and wanting to know where you are at all times. Warning signs can include when your partner:

- Frequently calls, continuously messaging you and/or constantly asking where you are.
- Follows you around and/or shows up at your home, school or work without invitation or warning.
- Insists on driving you everywhere or checks your car mileage when you return.

Isolation, teasing (belittling) and gaslighting:

These behaviors can easily be identified when your partner:

- Encourages you to quit school or work, or to stop participating in activities and hobbies.
- Makes jokes about you or your culture or put you down for being Native.
- Loses their temper with you or yells at you in private but stays calm around others.
- Blames their former partners for abuse in previous relationships.

ONLINE DATING

Catfishing: Vague or incomplete profiles can be a sign that they are trying to hide something about themselves or pretend to be someone or something they are not.

Digital abuse: Sending sexually explicit photos or messages is a clear indication of not having respect for you. When this happens without your consent, it could be considered a form of sexual harassment. The same can be said when the interested party requests sexually explicit pictures.

Either way, the person does not respect your boundaries.

Digital abuse also includes asking for your device passwords, sharing your private messages and using tracking devices to know your whereabouts which can be done without your consent or knowledge. It may seem like a harmless gesture used to keep track of you "for your safety," but over time can turn into something a bit more sinister.

Online dating tips

Until you establish a level of comfort between you and a potential partner, it is important to maintain your safety and privacy. Be careful not to provide too much personal information about yourself and that includes where you live.

- Instead of using your full name, use a nickname on your dating profile.
- If you are not comfortable saying, "yes" to a meet up, don't rush it and wait until you feel safe.
- If you do agree to meet up, go to a public area and tell a friend or relative about your plans.
- Bring a friend! Never meet up alone with a stranger or invite them to your place of residence.
- Listen to and trust your instincts. If something doesn't feel right, if something feels off, call off your date.
- If you are already in a meet up and are feeling unsafe, be sure to have a backup plan in order to call for help.

In summary, the art of romance can be fun and lead to healthy relationships, but when things seem too good to be true, they probably are, and your best line of defense is to pay attention to verbal and physical cues that something isn't right. Listen to your inner voice and trust your instincts.

Air quality and smoke outlook related to regional wildfires

Smoke from wildfires can cause unhealthy PM levels

The Southern Ute Indian Tribe's Environmental Programs Division continuously collects ambient air monitoring data at three locations on the Reservation to ensure that the air is healthy for tribal members and residents of the Reservation and surrounding communities. This data and corresponding EPA Air Quality Index (AQI) health alerts are available in real-time on the Tribe's ambient monitoring program website to help people make informed decisions about when the outdoor air is healthy to breathe. The stations are located in Ignacio (Ute 1), on Bondad Hill (Ute 3), and at Lake Capote (MMS).

Smoke from wildfires can cause unhealthy levels of fine particulate matter (PM) in the air. The Interagency Wildland Fire Air Quality Response Program issued Smoke Outlook Advisories related to the Bear Creek and Quartz Ridge fires. The Environmental Programs Division ambient air monitoring stations will issue an air quality alert if the condi-

tions worsen. The Tribe's ambient monitoring program can be viewed at: www.southernute-nsn.gov/justice-and-regulatory/epd/air-quality/ambient-monitoring/

The two primary air quality issues of concern on the Reservation are smoke and dust particulate matter from local, regional, and western wildfires and dust storms, and ground level ozone, which forms during the summer months due to a chemical reaction in the atmosphere between volatile organic compounds (VOCs), nitrogen oxides (NOx) and heat/sunlight.

Particulate matter is continuously measured at the Ignacio and Bondad Hill mon-

itoring locations and ozone is monitored at all three locations. Measured air pollutant concentrations fluctuate throughout the day based on wind speed and direction, solar radiation, humidity, pressure and temperature.

The table below summarizes the number of days in 2023 where the AQI was Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups or worse.

For the remainder of 2023 there is low likelihood for days to be Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups or worse for ozone. The likelihood for days like that for PM will depend on the number, severity and location of fires. In the event such occurs, the AQP will issue an air quality alert.

PROTECTION AGENCY

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced \$531,000 in Sewer Overflow and Stormwater Reuse Municipal Grant program funding to help Colorado communities address stormwater and sewer infrastructure needs.

States may now apply for grant assistance to fund projects that will help municipalities strengthen their wastewater and stormwater collection systems against increasingly intense rain events and prevent contaminants from polluting waterways. Thanks to program updates made by the Biden-Harris Administration's Investing in America Agenda, the Sewer Overflow and Stormwater Reuse Municipal Grant program will ensure small and financially distressed communities receive grant assistance at no cost.

"Heavy rainfall can flood communities, overload facilities that collect and treat wastewater and contaminate our waterways with sewage and pollution," said KC Becker, EPA Regional Administrator. "With \$531,000 in grant funding, EPA is helping Colorado address the threat of stormwater inundation in communities that need it most."

Stormwater management is a complex environmen-



tal challenge for communities across the country. The costs to construct, operate and maintain stormwater infrastructure can be significant. This investment follows changes made by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to prioritize projects for small and/or financially distressed communities and prevents cost share requirements from being passed on to these communities.

This funding for Colorado is part of the \$50 million in grants that EPA made available nationally. Learn more about the Sewer Overflow and Stormwater Reuse Municipal Grant program.

Stormwater can be a significant source of water pollution and a public health concern. Stormwater can collect various pollutants including trash, chemicals, oils and sediment and convey them to nearby waterways. Stormwater and groundwater can also enter wastewater collection systems through stormwater

routed to the sewage system, manholes in low-lying area, and leaky or broken sewer pipes. When mixed with domestic and industrial wastewater, stormwater can overwhelm the wastewater sewer pipes and contribute to sewer overflows during heavy storm events.

In the past, states and communities shared a portion of the costs associated with projects funded through the Sewer Overflow and Stormwater Reuse Municipal Grant program. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law changed the program so that 25% of Sewer Overflow and Stormwater Reuse Municipal Grant program funds go to available projects in small and/or financially distressed communities. To encourage investment in these critical projects, EPA also modified the grant program so that state grantees are not required to contribute cost share money for projects in small or financially distressed communities.

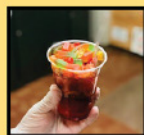

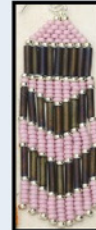

History Colorado is happy to announce the twenty-five Centennial Farms & Ranches honorees for 2023. Created in partnership with the Colorado Department of Agriculture, the Centennial Farms & Ranches Program honors the contributions of the state’s ranching and farming families who have withstood the pressures of growth, changes in farming methods, drought, and economic conditions to preserve important pieces of our state’s commercial and cultural history.

The 2023 honorees include both farms and ranches as well as families, agribusinesses, and a farmer who dedicated the majority of their more than 100 years of life to agricultural pursuits within Colorado. Honorees were recognized at the 2023 Colorado State Fair on Friday, Aug. 25 at the Colorado State Fairgrounds in Pueblo, Colo.

“In Colorado, agriculture is foundational to understanding our collective roots,” said Dawn DiPrince, president/CEO of History Colorado and State Historic Preservation Officer. “This beloved annual event spotlights the agricultural people and families who have persevered for more than 100 years and continue to preserve the food systems that nourish us.”

In addition to celebrating the 2023 Centennial Farms & Ranches honorees, DiPrince and Colorado Commissioner of Agriculture, Kate Greenberg, will present the second annual Agricultural Legacy Awards.

Ute Mountain Ute Tribe Farm and Ranch Enterprise | Colorado Commissioner of Agriculture Legacy in Agriculture Award | Montezuma County

Nestled in Southwest Col-

orado below the sleeping Ute Mountain on Ute Mountain Ute Tribal land, the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe Farm and Ranch Enterprise is a true beacon of adaptation, innovation, and sustainability. Rooted in Tribal culture and history, this 7700-acre operation - built over the last nearly four decades by General Manager Simon Martinez and his team – raises alfalfa, corn, and cattle.

The team leading the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe Farm and Ranch Enterprise never ceases to be on the leading edge of agricultural production, conservation, and cultural legacy. The enterprise raises everything from iconic Bow & Arrow Livestock and non-GMO corn meal by the same name that supplies restaurants around the country. The Farm and Ranch Enterprise also employs microhydro energy production and advanced irrigation technology, all while following the beneficial use of the water decree by the Colorado Ute Indian Water Rights Settlement.

About the Centennial Farms & Ranches Program

History Colorado, the Colorado Department of Agriculture, and the Colorado State Fair have partnered to honor Colorado’s agricultural heritage through the Centennial Farms & Ranches program since 1986, when the program was initiated by former Governor Richard Lamm.

In 2022, the Centennial Farms & Ranches program was expanded to recognize four categories of honorees associated with the agricultural history of the State of Colorado:

- Centennial Farms or Ranches – farms or ranches that have belonged to the same family for at least 100 years, and are currently working farms or ranches
- Centennial Families – families with agricultural experience in Colorado that spans 100 or more years (eg. 1923-present), not necessarily as landowners
- Centennial Farmers or Ranchers – individuals 100 years of age or older who have spent a majority of their life in agricultural pursuits within the State of Colorado, even if they were not landowners
- Centennial AgriBusiness – organizations or businesses that have been in operation for 100 or more years and primarily serve the agricultural community in Colorado (examples: seed companies, farm implement manufacturers, Farm Bureaus, etc.)

More than 663 families, agribusinesses, and individuals have been recognized by the program. Collectively, they represent the powerful history of Colorado’s farmers and ranchers who have sustained, supported, and innovated for more than 100 years.

What Tribal Planning ask of you.

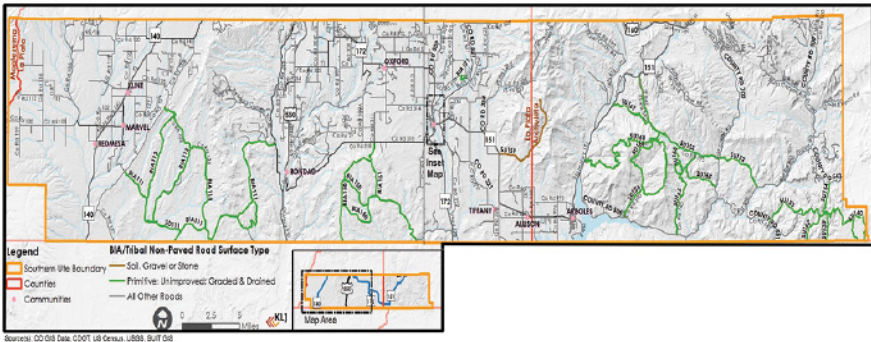

From there we will set a high-low priority for the road and a project date for the repair. Once the issue has been resolved, verification will be relayed back to the reporting party.

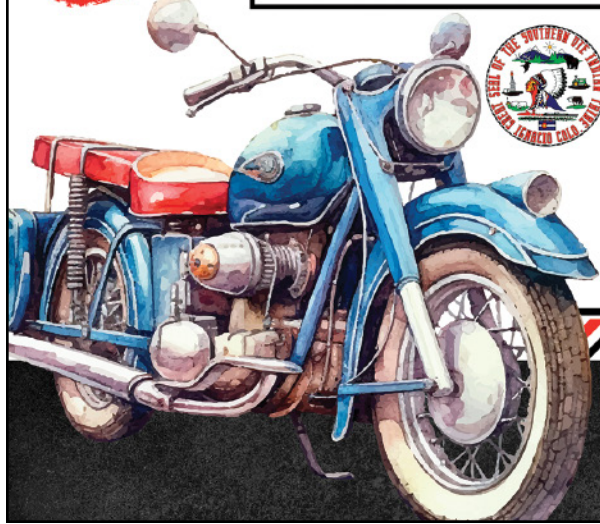

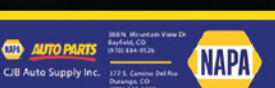

have no doubt that we will do well, but I just want to focus on being in the moment and what we have in front of us.”

Senior middle Soly-mar Cosio returns to anchor the Volleyscats’ net presence along with junior middle Ollyvia Howe, while senior Kacey Brown appears to be Seibel’s initial go-to at setter, with freshman Kelly Sirios – her daughter – an alternate option. Already established as libero/defensive specialist types, seniors Maci Barnes and Darlyn Mendoza-Lechuga will likely see their roles expanded offensively. er room up 31-0.

Pene returned IHS senior Wade Dunbar’s second-half kickoff 14 yards to the Miner 47, and North Fork’s drive began with 11:54 showing on the clock. With 11:45 showing, the outsiders’ advantage had grown to 38-0 after Moreno took a handoff from senior Hunter Moreno and blasted right through the middle for a morale-crushing 53-yard score.

Set up at their own 48 with 3:31 remaining following Montoya’s second pick and 21-yard return, the ‘Cats finally broke through and avoided a shutout fate. Helped by a 10-yard penalty tacked onto a 4-yard run by sophomore Lincoln deKay, Ignacio got on the board with 1:32 left when senior Rylan Maez dove and stretched the football just over the goal line, completing a 27-yard TD reception from Pontine along the visitors’ sideline.

Junior Charlie Pargin’s PAT try, however, was virtually smothered by NFHS sophomore Stellar Cook, leaving the score standing 38-6 after the 4-play, 52-yard possession. But the success was short-lived; after covering Dunbar’s squib kick at their own 37 with 1:31 remaining in the quarter, the Miners covered the required 63 yards in four swift snaps and hit paydirt for the last time via Hayden Moreno’s 35-yard TD pass to Hunter Moreno, who somehow caught the ball between Montoya and senior Marcus Maez, then

slipped into the end zone with 0:26.1 left as the converging ‘Cats collided.

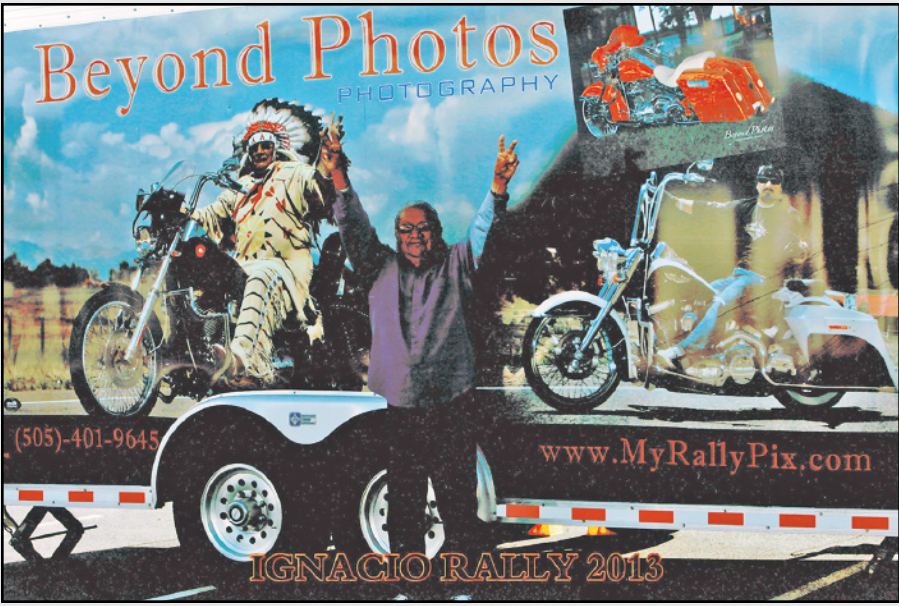

of vehicle passes.

Chatham County Line, Jim Lauderdale, Damn Tall Buildings, Songs from the Road Band, Laney Lou & the Bird Dogs, Cruz Contreras, Chain Station, Honey Dewdrops, Birds of Play and Liver Down the River complete the bill.

Cockburn is a Canadian singer/songwriter and guitarist whose musical style ranges from folk to jazz cover a broad range of topics including human rights, environmental issues and the human condition. Among his best-known songs are “Wondering Where the Lions Are,” “Lovers in a Dangerous Time,” “Pacing the Cage” and “Last Night of the World.” He has been covered by artists such as Jerry Garcia, Jimmy Buffett, and Barenaked Ladies.

Rowan is one of the most important figures in American roots music, having started as a member of Bill Monroe’s Blue Grass Boys in 1963 before forming such iconic groups as Earth Opera, Sea Train, Muleskinner and Old & in the Way in the late 1960s and early ’70s. In his 50-plus years of performing, he has weaved through bluegrass, folk, rock, reggae and other genres. He has penned such classics as “Panama Red,” “The Walls of Time,” “Dustbowl Children” and “The Free Mexican Air Force.” Last fall Rowan was inducted into the International Bluegrass Music Association (IBMA) Hall of Fame.

Kiah is a singer/songwriter whose songs transcend indie rock, Americana and old-time music. In 2019 she teamed up with Rhianon Giddens, Leyla McCalla and Allison Russell to form Our Native Daughters, an African-American women’s folk quartet that won a Grammy Award in 2020 for their recording of her tune “Black Myself.” She later

re-recorded that song with award-winning electronica musician Moby.

Gangstagrass returns to Reservoir Hill for the second year in a row, having become a crowd favorite last fall for its 75-minute performance on the Dan Appenzeller Memorial Stage while a summer monsoon forced spectators under the big tent. Gangstagrass plays an unlikely musical pairing of hip-hop and bluegrass. Its message of positivity finds common ground between different ethnicities, socio-economic backgrounds and political beliefs.

Chatham County Line is a longtime festival favorite in the bluegrass world that has recently focused on Americana and country music to spotlight the musical styles of award-winning songwriter Dave Wilson, mandolin/fiddle player John Teer and upright bassist/pedal steel player Greg Readling. They have appeared at such regional events as the Durango Bluegrass Meltdown and Rockygrass.

Jim Lauderdale’s music alternates between traditional country, bluegrass and Americana. Best known as a songwriter, his songs have been recorded by George Strait (who scored hits with nearly a dozen Lauderdale-written tunes), Blake Shelton and Elvis Costello. He released a pair of records with Ralph Stanley & the Clinch Mountain Boys and collaborated on several albums with Grateful Dead lyricist Robert Hunter. His backing band at the Four Corners Folk Festival is Songs from the Road Band, a jamgrass outfit led by former Steep Canyon Rangers bassist Charles Humphrey III. Songs from the Road Band will also perform its own main stage set.

Three Americana and bluegrass-flavored acts with strong female vocalists and musicians include the

Brooklyn-based Damn Tall Buildings, Boulder’s The Sweet Lillies and Montana’s Laney Lou & the Bird Dogs.

Cruz Contreras has performed on Reservoir Hill a half-dozen times with his old outfits, The Black Lillies and Robinella & the CCstringband. The Black Lillies went on hiatus during the pandemic, allowing Contreras to focus on his solo career. His debut solo album, Cosmico, will be released later this year.

The Honey Dewdrops are a folk duo from Baltimore that formed in 2009 and have released a series of strong albums, including 2022’s Light Behind Light. Their sparse arrangements and haunting melodies draw comparisons to Gillian Welch & David Rawlings.

Three Colorado bands popular in the Four Corners region round out the festival bill: Front Range bluegrass favorites Chain Station, Durango/Telluride Americana quartet Birds of Play and former Durango jam band Liver Down the River.

Festival amenities include a late-night stage, workshops, children’s tent, food and crafts vendors, campground picks and a beer garden featuring Breckenridge and Riff Raff beers and Talbott’s ciders and wines. As has become tradition, Saturday and Sunday mornings will kick off with Bubbles & Bluegrass, which pairs acoustic performances by Birds of Play (Saturday) and The Honey Dewdrops (Sunday) with complimentary beverages in the Breckenridge beer garden from 10 to 11 a.m.

Festival sponsors include Downs, McDonough, Cowan & Foley (patron tent), Project Moxie and La Plata Electric Association (workshop stage), First Southwest Bank (children’s tent), San Juan Vans (late night stage) and the Sky Ute Casino Resort (indigenous artist sponsor).

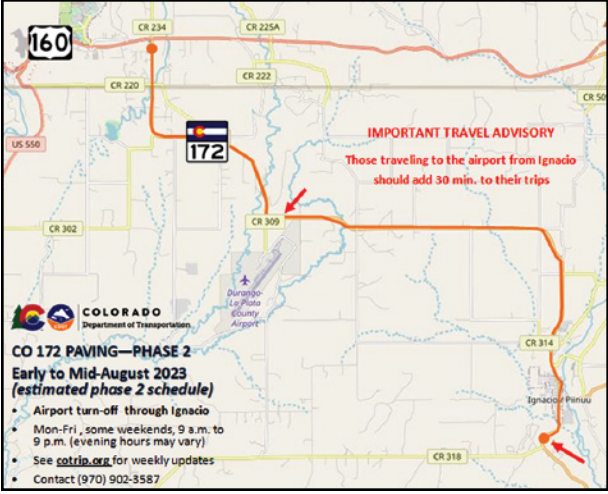

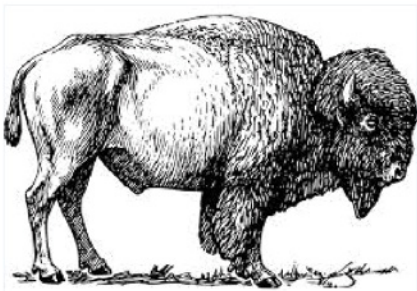

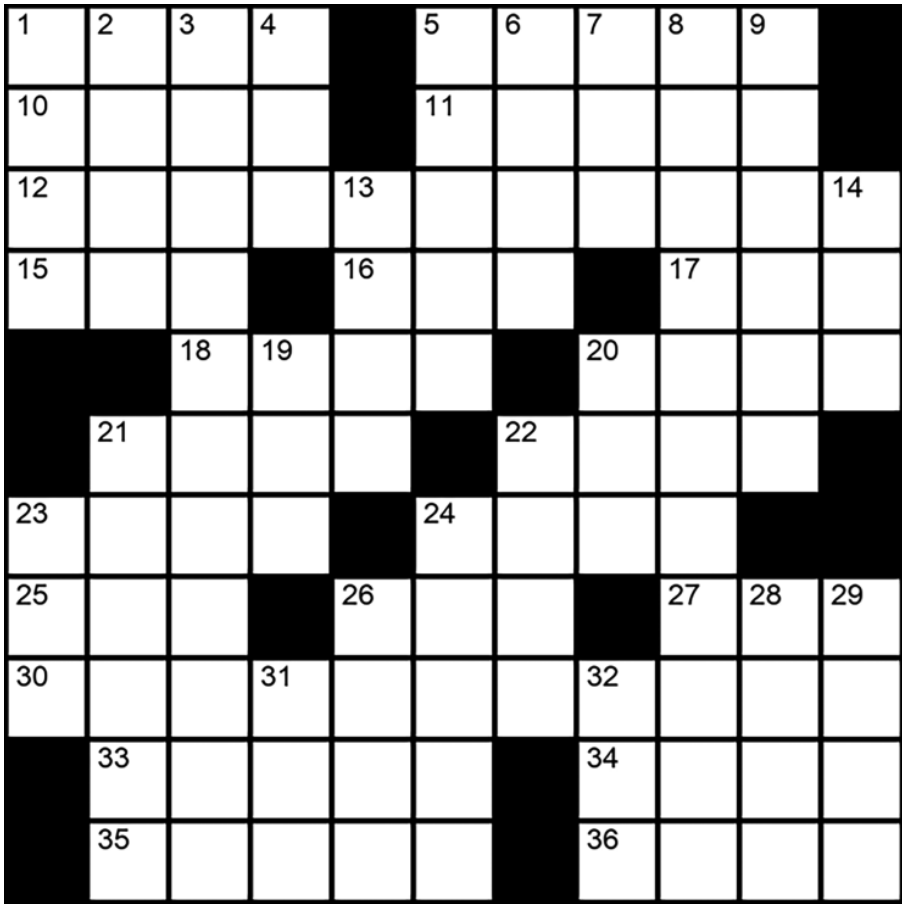
