I work at the Southern Ute dental clinic as a receptionist/scheduler. I have worked for the Dental Clinic for the past five years. As a front desk person, I answer phone calls, schedule appointments for patients, check insurances, submit pre-determinations, send referrals, as well

Zucchini shrimp boats

Try this easy, healthy recipe! To keep the cost down, buy what is on sale. Since the shrimp is cut up, you can use whatever size suits your pocketbook.

The shrimp can be fresh or frozen.

Zucchini Shrimp Boats

Ingredients

- · 4 zucchinis, cut in half lengthwise
- 1 tablespoon oil (olive, canola, etc.)
- · 1 Tablespoon and 1 teaspoon butter
- 12oz large raw shrimp; peeled, deveined, tails removed (thaw if frozen)
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice · 2 plum tomatoes, diced
- · 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- Salt and pepper to taste
- ½ cup panko breadcrumbs
- ½ cup grated parmesan 1 tablespoon fresh chopped parsley

Directions

For the zucchini boats:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Scoop out flesh of the zucchini halves (leave zucchini border about 1/4" thick.)
- 3. Chop the scooped-out flesh and place in a bowl, set aside.
- 4. Place zucchini halves in a large baking dish, sprinkle with olive oil, salt and pepper.
- 5. Bake until tender, about 15-20 minutes, remove from oven and set aside.

For the shrimp filling:

- 1. While zucchini is baking, melt 1 tablespoon butter in a large skillet over medium heat, add shrimp, Italian seasoning, salt and pepper to taste.
- 2. Cook until shrimp is pink, about 3-4 minutes, remove from skillet and set aside.
- 3. In same skillet, add an additional teaspoon butter and heat.
- 4. Add zucchini flesh, tomatoes, and garlic. Cook about 2-3 minutes. Turn off heat.
- 5. Chop shrimp into bite sized pieces and add to zucchini mixture, stir to combine. 6. Place mixture evenly into baked zucchini
- 7. In a small bowl, mix panko crumbs and parmesan, sprinkle evenly over zucchini/ shrimp boats.
- 8. Place zucchini/shrimp boats back in oven and heat for an additional 10-15 minutes or until golden and heated through.
- 9. Garnish with fresh parsley, serve and enjoy!

Zero provider turnover at Southern Ute Health Center

The Southern Ute Health Center (SUHC) currently has three full time providers and four part time providers, including a Pediatrician and an Internal Medicine provider. The SUHC has continued to maintain permanent staff of medical providers and has not staffed locum providers for the last five years. Locums are place holders, or temp positions in the world of medical practice.

SUHC has a total of seven healthcare providers onsite. This does not include physical therapy, behavioral health, dental, optometry, pharmacists, and visiting specialists.

Did You Get Your Measles. Mumps, and Rubella Vaccine?



What is the MMR Vaccine?

The MMR vaccine can prevent measles, mumps and rubella. Most people who get the MMR Vaccine are protected for life.

What is Measles?

Measles causes fever. cough, rash, runny nose and red, watery eyes. Comlications car include ear infections, diarrhea. pneumonia, brain

What is Mumps?

Mumps causes fever, headache, muscle aches, tiredness, loss of appetite, and swollen and tender salivary glands under the ears. Complications can lead to deafness, swelling of the brain and/or spinal cord, painful swelling of the testicles or ovaries, and rarely, death.

What is Rubella?

Rubella causes fever, sore throat, rash, headache, and red, itchy eyes. It can cause arthritis in half of teenage and adult women.
If rubella is caught during pregnancy, it can result in a miscarriage or the baby could be born with serious birth defects.

Who should get vaccinated?

- Children need 2 doses of the MMR vaccine:
- First dose: 12-15 months of age · Second dose: 4-6 years of age

Adults who are not already immune to measles, mumps, and rubella should get at least 1 dose of MMR vaccine. Certain adults may need 2 doses. Your health care provider will help determine the number of doses needed.





Hickenlooper, western senators introduce landmark bipartisan wildfire mitigation bill

U.S. Senators John Hickex Padilla, and Tim Sheehy introduced the Fix Our Forests Act, bipartisan legislation to combat growing catastrophic wildfires across Colorado and the United States. The bill works to strengthen wildfire resilience by improving forest management, supporting fire-safe communities, and streamlining approvals for projects that protect communities and ecosystems from extreme wildfires.

The comprehensive bill reflects months of bipartisan negotiations to find consensus on how to accelerate forest management projects, promote safe and responsible prescribed fire treatments, expand public input in assessments of wildfire resilience needs, and enhance collaboration between federal agencies, states, tribes, and stakeholders.



EPD expands nature trail

Utilities will be jetting this week in the Northridge residential area. There will be no jetting on Mondays or Fridays unless it is an emergency.







National Child Abuse Prevention Month

Former President Obama continued the tradition and in 2016, issued a Presidential proclamation stating: "During National Child Abuse Prevention Month, we recommit to giving every child a change to succeed and to ensuring that every child grows up in a safe, stable, and nurturing environment that is free from abuse and neglect."

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services states that for National Child Abuse Prevention Month, communities should rededicate themselves to being supportive of families and play an active role in preventing child abuse and neglect as well as taking a positive action to promote child and family well-being.

On April 5, 2017, the late Mr. Alex Cloud (egap), former Vice Chairman, signed and designated April as, "Southern Ute April Child Abuse Prevention Month":

WHEREAS, children on the Southern Ute Indian Reservation have a right to a safe, thriving, and growing environment so they can reach their full potential and benefit their generation and the next; and

WHEREAS, child abuse, neglect and the observation of violence can create adverse childhood experiences that can lead to emotional, psychological, and physical issues that can affect a child's quality of life, and

WHEREAS, the community members can come together and create a strong healthy support system by: providing safe and nurturing homes free from violence, neglect, and abuse; providing a Helfand to children and families in need; providing safe child-friendly events and activities outside the home; and by breaking the historical trauma cycle; and

WHEREAS, violence against children can be prevented by supporting and strengthening our community and making meaningful partnerships with our families, schools, and organizations, within the Southern Ute Indian Tribe and with the Town of Ignacio; and

WHEREAS, the Southern Ute Indian Tribe is committed to child abuse education and supports and recognizes the importance of dedicating a month to prevent and to raise awareness of the impacts of child abuse.

NOW, THEREFORE, in recognition of the foregoing, the Southern Ute Indian Tribal Council proclaims each month of April, from this day forward as, CHILD ABUSE PRE-VENTION MONTH for the Southern Ute Indian Reservation, and supports safe nurturing environments for our children to grow in. The Tribal Council encourages our community members to value the safety of our children and to give support to individuals and organizations providing services to our children and families.

The Division of Social Services invites the community and Tribal employees to demonstrate their support against child abuse for the month of April:

Request administrative or clerical assistance from tribal staff when necessary to issue orders and conduct Commission business; and Review emission inventories developed by the Tribe and State.

Preferred Commission Member Qualifications: Knowledge of Robert's Rules of Order; Knowledge of Federal, State and Tribal air quality regulations; Ethical, strong integrity; Ability to identify conflicts of interest; Knowledge of environmental issues affecting the Reservation; Able to attend regular Commission and stakeholder meetings; and Cooperative and able to work as a team player. Commission Member Appointment Terms and Conditions: Commission members are appointed by the Tribal Council. Commission members serve for three-year appointment terms and are not subject to term limits. Commission meetings are generally held twice per year, but more frequent meetings are possible. 

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

A change up in your retrieve can make a difference

My Friday fishing partner, Kim, and I decided that since spring was in the air, and the high mountain streams were still covered in snow, it would be a good day to fish at one of our favorite area lakes located on the Southern Ute Reservation, Lake Capote.


