# Southern Ute Reservation to initiate Stage II Fire Restrictions

SOUTHERN UTE INDIAN TRIBE

Due to the continued drought, extremely dry fuel conditions and the occurrence of recent large wildland fires, Stage II fire restrictions will be implemented for all trust lands throughout the Southern Ute Indian

Reservation. Everyone on reservation land is asked to be very cautious and use common sense with fire this time of year.

Stage II Fire Restrictions prohibits acts for the general public, commercial operators and industrial oil and gas operators performing work on the Southern Ute Reservation.

# Spotlight on Tribal Health: Kristen Anderson

Continuing in the effort to provide the highest quality medical care for the Southern Ute tribal membership, the Southern Ute Health Center would like to introduce you to Dr. Kristen Anderson, PharmD, BS Pharm, BCGS. Dr. Anderson joined our team in September of 2022 as our Ambulatory Care Clinical Pharmacist, bringing 30 years of pharmacist experience, and is currently seeing patients in the Southern Ute Health Clinic.

Kristen is a pharmacist and medication expert specializing in diabetes and the health care of elders. Clinic providers refer patients to Kristen who have been diagnosed with a medical issue that requires more frequent medication management and follow-up. Through a collaborative practice agreement with medical doctors and nurse practitioners in the clinic, she helps patients access some of the most state-of-the-art medications and diabetes care available today. She also educates patients on insulin pumps and continuous glucose monitors, enabling them to manage their blood sugars on a whole new level.

Dr. Anderson received her Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy from the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center in Denver in 1996 and completed her ASHP Residency in Hospital Phar-

macy Practice at the Detroit Medical Center in Detroit, Mich. in 1997. She has held Clinical Pharmacist positions at several large teaching hospitals around the country, developing Clinical Pharmacy Services, working in adult, pediatric, and neonatal ICUs, general medicine floors, and emergency rooms. In 2013, after 20 years of practice, she went back to school to get her Doctor of Pharmacy degree from the University of Florida and then became Board Certified in Geriatrics.

In 2016, she joined the Northern Navajo Medical Center in Shiprock, N.M., working in outpatient clinic settings, in-patient hospital floors, and the emergency room. While there, she trained and became a Pharmacist Clinician through UNM Med School and 500 hours of patient contact at NNMC. Eventually, she began seeing patients inde-

pendently in various areas of specialty. This role was very helpful in preparing her for her current position at the Southern Ute Health Center.

Anderson has called Durango home since she was three years old and has had the fortune of enjoying all the area has to offer for many years. She enjoys skiing, cycling, spending time with friends, enjoying the outdoors in the Colorado mountains, and traveling. She currently lives in Durango and will be welcoming a new puppy into her home this month!

Kristen has enjoyed getting to know people in the Southern Ute community and being able to serve as a member of the healthcare team at the Southern Ute Health Clinic. Her favorite thing about her job is the time she gets to spend listening to her patients and helping them meet their health care goals.

# Ute youth hit the Animas River Whitewater Park

Just northwest of Ignacio, at the Santa Rita Whitewater Park, the Animas River flows through the Southern Ute Reservation and into northern New Mexico. The river has long been a prime destination for recreational water sports, where locals and tourists enjoy rafting, tubing, fishing, and kayaking. To increase diversity on the water, Four Corners River Sports offered programming specific to Ute youth, supported by grant funding, to teach them how to kayak. Led by Native kayaking guide, Sage Nicolai, the youth spent a week on the river gaining an immersive kayaking experience.

Southern Ute tribal members – Matthew Carrillo and Leandro Litz Jr. spent time with Nicolai and other guides out on the Animas River, Monday, July 28 through Friday, Aug. 1, learning the ins and outs of the sport. The Animas River is one of the best rafting and kayaking locations in Colorado and brings in nearly 10% of Colorado's rafting revenue. Located in Durango, Colo., the Santa Rita Whitewater Park is an artificially designed area of rapids in the Animas River. The park also features viewing areas, public open

space, and more.

"In collaboration with Kristean Velasquez and Ashleigh Tucker, who helped secure our grant funding, we were able to identify 'Tuk' [Matthew Carrillo] and 'Jr.' [Leandro Litz Jr.] as two Southern Ute kids that would really benefit from this experience," Nicolai said. "Just

watching them evolve over those five days, from taking a stroke and having a spinout to kayaking down a class three wave on the Smelter, was incredible." Nicolai is a kayaking guide with Four Corners River Sports in Durango, hailing from the Flathead

## Stage II Fire Restrictions

Effective: August 8, 2025 at 6:00 AM, and will remain until conditions improve

Due to high fire danger resulting from prolonged hot and dry conditions, Stage II Fire Restrictions have been implemented and the following acts are prohibited:



All Stage One Restrictions remain in effect:

- Open Burning
- Campfire
- Agricultural Burning
- Fireworks



Stage Two Restrictions include the following daily:

- "Hoot-Owl" is in effect: Operating or using any internal combustion engine between the hours of 1:00 PM to 8:00 PM is prohibited.
  - The use of combustion engines without a spark arrester is also prohibited.
- Motorized vehicle travel off developed roads is prohibited during the Hoot-Owl period.

A patrol is required for a period of two hours after cessation of activities. The patrol is responsible for watching for emerging fires, reporting fires, and initiating initial suppression.

After the workshop visit the Native Plants garden across from the museum to learn about Colorado's native plants beneficial to the Ute and other indigenous tribes. Stop by our outdoor classroom designed to connect children to the land and the Ute history. Our outdoor classroom also features Shavano Ute rock art like the rock art found in the Shavano Valley.

BEE HEARD: Blue light & sleep

Welcome back reader! For those of you who read the previous piece from BEE HEARD on sunlight and its role in our total wellness, this is a continuation of that story. But do not worry if you missed it. Today we are exploring the many beautiful colors of light, and how they have different effects on us, especially now in the age of artificial light in our homes.

The sun's light contains a broad spectrum of light from the highest wavelengths, producing red, orange, yellow, and green, as well as shorter wavelengths which include blue, violet, and ultraviolet. You can observe this in nature when you see a rainbow and notice how the water droplets break up the sun's light waves into separate colors from the spectrum.

Artificial light, by contrast, is less powerful and can contain a broad or narrow spectrum of light depending on how it was designed. We now can have lights that are only blue, or only red, or some combination and make them brighter or softer to our liking.

We know that the light of the sun is beneficial to us, and that modern technological lights have allowed us to brighten dark places and take control of when and how long we have access to light. Much attention is now being placed on how the different kinds of light affect us, and you may have heard about how the shorter waves of blue light, but also violet and UV light affect our ability to sleep at night. Let me share with you what I've learned about these issues.

Blue light suppresses natural melatonin production in our bodies, which is a process our body must work up to slowly via the circadian rhythm. All kinds of bright light can do this, but according to a study out of Harvard medical school, the impact of blue light was about three times more powerful at reducing our melatonin and shifting our circadian rhythm later into the evening. Depending on your sleep schedule (and where in the world you live) avoiding bright light of any kind, and blue light from artificial lights, between 10 p.m. and 4 a.m., will help to set a circadian rhythm that aligns with the cycle of sun.

Dim, red light is shown to be much less disruptive to our melatonin and circadian rhythm, and better yet is having these lights placed in our homes lower than eye level. How does that help? Well, think about how when the sun is high overhead that means its peak daytime; and in the evening it sinks below the horizon. So, in effect we are trying to bring the natural horizon and the sunset into our homes by placing dim, natural or artificial lights near or on the floor with this little trick. How dim is dim enough? Some examples of dim light from Dr. Andrew Huberman are candlelight and moonlight, which are much less intense and great for evening light reduction. Dr. Huberman reminds us that any bright light, regardless of color, will delay our natural melatonin creation and make it harder for us to fall and stay asleep.

Blue light blocking glasses are also helpful for those of us who have late shifts and work on computers at night, but please do not use blue light glasses as a trick to continue scrolling on your phone at bedtime, because at the end of the day, it's time to go to sleep!

Do your brain a favor, learn something new!

There is a common misperception that after a certain age, our brains stop growing and developing. In fact, due to two incredible capabilities, neurogenesis and neuroplasticity, our brains can continue to not only create new cells but even form new neural pathways throughout our lifetimes.

You might ask, so what? But laying down new neural pathways doesn't just mean you are acquiring information. It means you are enhancing your brain's resiliency in all kinds of ways. Studies show that individuals who challenge their brains with regular stimulation (i.e. learning) demonstrate enhanced attention span and memory retention. perhaps most importantly, engaging in lifelong learning has been shown to decrease a person's risk of developing dementia.

The best part is that stimulating neurogenesis and plasticity in your brain is something we can all do every day. All it takes is a little curiosity, and a willingness to try something new.

Indian Reservation he has been active in water sports since age 16. Nicolai got started rafting through his father, then later got into kayaking, this year he completed his certification to become a kayak guide through Four Corners River Sports. In his time on the river, Nicolai noticed a lack in diversity amongst the classes he was leading – being Indigenous himself, it became a goal to introduce this water sport to other Indigenous youth.

“I didn’t really notice that big of a diversity within the classes, and myself being Native, I had the idea that maybe I can help get some neighboring Ute kids out here to come and kayak and have fun,” Nicolai said. “Kayaking is such a fun sport for me, I really enjoy it, and I wanted to be able to spread that wealth a bit – so after talking to my bosses

about the idea we discussed getting the kids sponsored through the Animas River Days nonprofit, empowering youth through whitewater paddling scholarships.”

Matthew Carrillo and Leandro Litz Jr. kicked off the week out at Lake Night-horse learning to wear their safety gear and becoming familiar with the different parts of the kayak. As the week progressed, they moved to the Oxbow Park at the north end of Durango, to discuss important river safety, mapping out their paths and learning the river – days three and four consisted of learning different paddles strokes down the river from 29th street at Memorial Park to 9th street at Schneider Park. On the final day, the youth ventured to the Santa Rita Whitewater Park where they navigated the waterslide features of the

river in their kayaks. The youth used that day to focus on having fun, while putting their new skills to the test.

“I haven’t had a class all year that has done Smelter one time, these kids had progressed so fast compared to my other classes, they are quick learners,” Nicolai said. “Some of the kids were scared at first but just seeing them slowly go further down the river and persevere that made me really proud – these things can apply in life too, not just in kayaking.”

In the future Nicolai and Four Corners River Sports hope to continue to bring more Ute relatives and other Natives out on the river. This opportunity also allowed for the students to challenge themselves, explore their ancestral Ute lands, create friendships, and get outdoors.

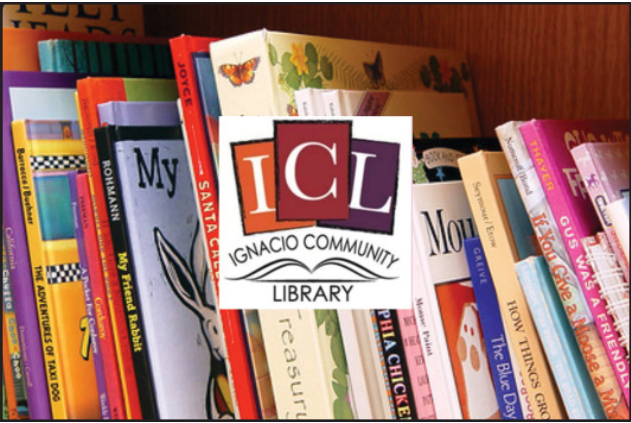
Little things we do in our  
everyday life that keep us  
safe and healthy

Nathan Aguilar and Sierra Roe from the La Plata County Health Department come to Ignacio Community Library (ICL) twice a month to provide Harm Reduction Services (HRS) for the public. To be honest, when they first started coming here, I didn’t really understand what HRS was, so I took the opportunity to interview them. They were kind enough to field my questions and provide some clarity around the topic.

HRS “is simply, little things we do in our everyday life that keep us safe and healthy. This could be staying hydrated, going on walks, speaking with friends and family, wearing a seatbelt or a helmet when on a motorcycle. Our program focuses on HR related to substance use, whether that be teaching people about naloxone/FTS, safe use supplies, and reducing internal and external stigma within SU,” according to Aguilar and Roe.

FTS refers to Fentanyl Test Strips, which can be used to avoid accidental fentanyl ingestion. Along with FTS, Naloxone, an



otherwise harmless medication that can reverse an opioid overdose, is one of the products HRS provides. It’s important to remember that “naloxone is not just for individuals who are using illicit substances,” according to Aguilar and Roe, citing a recent case of an older adult who accidentally overdosed by mistakenly double taking a prescribed opiate after a recent surgery. This type of accidental overdose is not uncommon. Any household with prescribed opiates in the medicine cabinet should consider also keeping naloxone.

Aguilar and Roe stress that one of the primary goals of HRS is “reducing internal and external stigma” around substance abuse. They added, “By decreasing stigma, people would be able to

talk about substance use and how it affects themselves and their family. We understand that people always have and will continue using substances. Our main goal is to ensure the safety of individuals within this community.” They shared that although the primary goal of HRS is not to get individuals into recovery, “participants are five times more likely to enter into recovery” than those who do not seek HRS.

You can find these HRS folks at ICL on the first and third Tuesday of every month from 10-12 in the board room at the top of the stairs, but ICL isn’t the only location to access these services. “Once a week we will offer services at our home office in Durango (185 Suttle St) and at Community Compassion Outreach, and once a month at Lumien Apartments. Other than that, we offer naloxone distribution and STI testing at Manna Resource center three times a month and are expanding testing efforts to CCO an additional two days a month,” they said. CCO stands for Community Compassion Outreach, which is in Durango, Colo.

Even if you don’t need these services for yourself or your family, feel free to say hello when you see them in the community!

FIRE RESTRICTIONS • FROM PAGE 1

- yard waste is prohibited.
2. **AGRICULTURAL BURNING.** Burning of crop land, fields, rangeland, debris burning, slash piles, prescribed burning and weed burning are prohibited.
3. **CAMPFIRES.** Building, maintaining or using a warming fire or campfire outside of officially designated or developed camp sites is prohibited. Charcoal broilers and wood and coal stoves used outside of dwellings are classified as campfires and prohibited. Fires for ceremonial sweats are allowed upon notification of the local fire authority and/or BIA Fire office and approval from them.
4. **FIREWORKS.** Possession, discharging or use of any type or fireworks is prohibited. **SMOKING.** Smoking is restricted to designated areas, within structures or within vehicles equipped with ashtrays.
5. **OPERATING EQUIPMENT.** Operating or using any internal combustion engine (chainsaws, generators, etc) without a spark arresting device properly installed, maintained and in effective working order.
- STAGE II Commercial Operators (logging, thinning, firewood gathering, etc.):**
- All Prohibited Acts included for Stage I.**
1. All field personnel shall carry local emergency dispatch phone numbers with them at all times. All fires must be reported to local emergency dispatch immediately.
2. "Hoot-Owl" is in effect. Operating or using any internal combustion engine between the hours of 1:00 PM to 8:00 PM local time is prohibited.
3. Motorized vehicle travel off developed roads is prohibited during the same "Hoot-Owl" period.
4. A patrol is required for a period of two hours after cessation of activities. The patrol is responsible for watching for emerging fires, reporting fires and initiating initial suppression.
- Industrial restrictions are attached and also can be obtained from the BIA Fire Office at 575 County Road 517. Anyone violating the provisions of this fire ban may be subject to prosecution outlined in the Southern Ute Indian Criminal Code. The Restrictions will become effective at 0600 on August 8, 2025, and will remain until conditions improve.

Fire breaks out near Ignacio

Two Airtankers, or very large airtankers (VLATs), deliver fire retardant to the Rim Road Fire aiding in the suppression of the fire on Saturday, July 26. As reported on WatchDuty.org, the Rim Road Fire is 90% contained, per the National Interagency Fire Center (NIFC). In a report released by the BIA Southern Ute Agency, as of July 31, 106 personnel were still assigned securing containment lines and mop-up operations.



Flames rose high into the air from winds fanning the flames and creating huge plumes of smoke. Residents were placed on evacuation notice around 3700 Country Road 318 and all residents on Lenyx Lane, west of Ignacio. Escalante Middle School in Durango served as evacuation shelter for both the Rim Road and Elkhorn fires. Both fires broke out simultaneously. The Elkhorn fire began as a structure fire on private property before spreading onto the San Juan National Forest. The Middle Mesa Fire, a lightning-caused wildfire in the Jicarilla Ranger District of the Carson National Forest, continues to burn with over 3,000 acres burned. The Waters Canyon Fire also continues to burn as of Aug. 5, as reported on WatchDuty.org., which is located one mile outside Mesa Verde National Park, with 175 acres burned per the National Interagency Fire Center (NIFC).

Bipartisan bill to improve snowpack monitoring, help manage water

U.S. Senators John Hickenlooper and John Curtis introduced the bipartisan Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program Reauthorization Act of 2025 to help better predict and measure water supply to manage drought in the West, including on the Colorado River. July 25 was Colorado River Day, which celebrates the day when the river was officially renamed to the Colorado River in 1921.

“You can’t manage what you can’t measure,” Hickenlooper said. “Snowmelt is Colorado’s largest reservoir. Leveraging advanced snow monitoring tech will give us more accurate water predictions and unlock a better understanding of how to make the most of our water in an era of extreme drought.”

“In the West, water is everything – our economy, our communities, and our way of life depend on it,” Curtis said. “This bill brings 21st century tools to one of the oldest challenges we face: knowing how much water we’ll have and when. By reauthorizing this program, we’re embracing

new technology like airborne snow surveys and advanced modeling to give our water managers the clarity they need to prepare, allocate, and respond.”

More than 80% of Colorado’s annual surface water supply comes from snowmelt runoff. Accurate measurements of snowpack are necessary to have a clear picture of the snowmelt that feeds rivers and streams across the West.

The bipartisan legislation would reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation’s (BOR) Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program which provides grants to advance emerging snow monitoring technology that improve water supply predictions.

- Specifically, the bill would:
- Reauthorize BOR’s Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program through 2031.
  - Increase authorization from \$15 million over five years to \$32.5 million over five years.
  - Update language in existing authorization to emphasize water supply forecasting activities that inform interstate water management decisions.
- Yesterday, Representatives

Joe Neguse and Jeff Hurd’s companion legislation advanced out of the House Committee on Natural Resources.

As governor, Hickenlooper helped negotiate the 2019 Colorado River Basin Drought Contingency Plan, which helped protect critical levels at Lake Powell and Lake Mead and ensured continued compliance with the 1922 Colorado River Compact. In the Senate, Hickenlooper convened the bipartisan Colorado River Caucus to help address the Colorado River crisis.

The bipartisan Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program Reauthorization Act of 2025 is supported by American Rivers, the Southwestern Water Conservation District, Colorado River District, Denver Water, Colorado Department of Natural Resources, Colorado Water Congress, Colorado Municipal League, Associated Governments of Northwest Colorado, the Environmental Defense Fund, The Nature Conservancy, the National Ski Areas Association, the Family Farm Alliance, the National Audubon Society, and the Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Partnership.

FEMA announces \$1 Billion in disaster preparedness grants

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) released Notices of Funding Opportunity (NOFOs) for 15 grant programs, making nearly \$1 billion available to communities across the country. These funds will enable states and tribal nations to strengthen

their preparedness for natural disasters such as wildfires, floods, earthquakes, hurricanes, and tornadoes, as well as human-caused incidents including terrorist attacks and cyber disruptions. Since Friday, July 25, FEMA has announced more than \$2.2 billion in total funding opportunities for state, local, tribal, and territorial governments working to safeguard their communities.

To support Tribal Emergency Directors and Managers in navigating these funding opportunities, FEMA and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) held a webinar for tribal leaders, Tribal Emergency Management Directors, and Managers on Thursday, Aug. 7.

# Scams continue via texts posing as Colorado Express Lanes, ExpressToll and EZ Pass

Over the last two years, attempts to scam toll road and Express Lane users across Colorado and the U.S. through fraudulent text alerts have remained unceasing. The scammers typically pose as a toll service, such as Colorado’s ExpressToll, and request users to pay an outstanding toll amount to avoid a late fee.

The Colorado Transportation Investment Office (CTIO), the independent organization within CDOT responsible for Express Lanes, never uses text messaging to collect any payments or personal information from customers. If you receive a text message asking for payment of a toll or an Express Lanes violation in Colorado, it’s a scam.

Text recipients could be deceived into giving away sensitive personal information, including credit card numbers. For their own security, Coloradans are advised to avoid clicking on any links or providing personal information if they receive a text message regarding tolling matters similar to the one below:

Example: *“ExpressToll final reminder: You have an outstanding toll account balance. If you fail to pay by Aug. 26, 2025, you will face additional charges or legal action. Pay your balance now at [scam website address].”*

A number of these texts have come from numbers with a +63 country code, which indicates the message was sent from a number in the Philippines.

While there have been many instances of Colorado residents receiving these scam texts, because they are originating outside of CDOT and CTIO, the state cannot stop their distribution. This issue remains under active investigation with the FBI Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) and people who receive one of these texts are advised to take the following steps:

- File a complaint with the IC3 at [www.ic3.gov](http://www.ic3.gov), and include:
- The phone number from where the text originated.
- The website listed within the text.
- Check your toll account for your actual toll balance at ExpressToll.com.
- Check for any Express Lane safety violations at [expresslanesafety.com](http://expresslanesafety.com).
- Delete any fraudulent texts received.

If you clicked any links or provided your information, make efforts to secure your personal information and financial accounts. Dispute any unfamiliar charges.

**RICHARDS** – Kean Goodman “Snow” Richards was born May 30, 1948, to Bob Richards and Alice Williams Richards, at their home on the Southern Ute Reservation in Ignacio, Colo. Surrounded by his family, Kean passed away peacefully at Mercy Medical Center on Thursday, July 24, 2025, at 8:40 a.m., at the age of 77 years old.

He was preceded in death by his mother Alice Williams Richards, father Bob Richards, Uncle Harry Richards, half-brother Frank Benicraft, half-sister Essie Kent, his oldest son Robert Richards, foster

children Donald and Philip Martinez, and his grandson Johnathan Lee Winlock.

He is survived by his wife Rena Ortiz Richards, six children: Ross Jacket, Laura Richards, Kenneth Richards, Calvin Richards, Frances Richards and Esther Richards, his 15 grandchildren, 16 great grandchildren, and extended family.

Kean Goodman Richards AKA “King Kong” was a proud tribal member of the Southern Ute Tribe. He was also part Ute Mountain Ute and was a direct descendant to Chief Severo. He worked for the Southern Ute Tribe for 30 plus years. Kean fulfilled his civic duty in the community as a former pastor. He was devoted to his family, his culture, the traditions, and was a true believer in Sundance - that he never missed.

On July 30, 1962, Kean married the love of his life Rena. He had many passions from being a drummer for various blues bands, using his green thumb to grow and maintain his lawn, trees, and garden, riding his motorcycles, and the list goes on. But the one passion he loved the most was being a teacher, a father figure to his grandchildren and a strong leader for his family.

Funeral services were held Monday, July 28, 2025, at the Southern Ute Memorial Chapel in Ignacio, Colo. Burial followed at the Southern Ute Ouray Cemetery. All were invited to a reception following the service at the Southern Ute Multi-Purpose Facility.

**The Utes and Jicarilla Apache**

The Utes and Jicarilla Apache were very upset with the Americans who did not keep a promise to protect Native lands from invading settlers.

At an 1854 a treaty council, the chiefs received soldier Jackets as gifts for signing a peace treaty the chief’s and hundreds of us Utes died with smallpox. Nearly half of the 700 Moache Ute band died. In revenge us Utes attacked San Luis Valley on Dec. 24, 1854, the chief Tierra Blanca and his band of Utes and Jicarilla Apache attacked and killed everyone at (EL-Pueblo Trading Post.) Four of the Apache and Utes also died they captured two boys-felix Sandoval, age 12 and his brother Juan Isidro, age 7, - and a woman, Chipeta Miera who soon died. Felix was rescued eight months later when the Utes and Apache asked for a peace council at Abiquiu, New Mexico Juan Isidro had been traded to the Navajos.

He Lived with them for nearly six years, a Mexican trader saw him during a trade visit to the Navajo camp he bought the by and sold him back to his mother in Santa Fe, New Mexico for 300 silver dollars, for 12 years, EL Pueblo trading post offered a place to trade and a base camp for traveling traders and their families, the Cheyenne, (us Utes) Kiowa and a Arapaho often camped nearby and brought their valuable animal hides and beaded clothing to trade. After the 1854 attack, the post was deserted, its adobe bricks of later used to build the new town of Pueblo Colorado as we know it today.

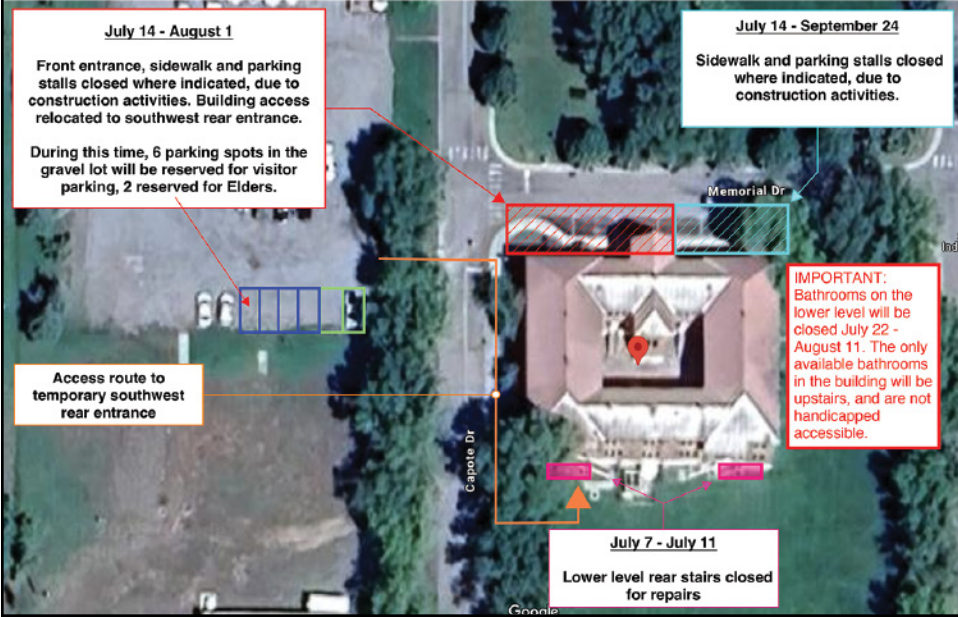



Cleaning hotel room by wiping, washing, scrubbing, vacuuming, sweeping, and mopping all the areas of the guest rooms. Requires the ability to bend, lift, stand and walk throughout the shift, physically demanding and may be stressful at times, particularly during peak season periods. Will be cleaning an average of 16 guest rooms, and during peak season, up to 20 guest rooms per shift, depending on whether you are working as an individual or a pair. Will be responsible for cross training on the Casino Floor to assist with Operational Housekeeping when needed and as assigned.

**Seven Rivers Bartender (On-call)**  
Provide an exceptional fine dining/lounge experience by delivering first class guest service of beverages and cocktails. Possess an extensive knowledge of mixed drinks and wine. Mix and serve alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks and interact with guests. Handle tasks in a friendly, courteous, helpful, timely, and professional manner resulting in a high level of guest satisfaction. Provide beverage and cocktail service to bar patrons and restaurant guests.

**\*Shining Mountain Line Cook (Full-time)**  
Work under direct supervision and support of the Sous Chef or Lead Cook. Line Cook is responsible for the preparation of the Al La Carte menu in the Shining Mountain Café and accountable for consistency of standardized recipes, presentation, food quality and freshness. Ensure all guidelines are followed according to the established specifications and standards in food safety and sanitation. Requires one to be an excellent team player and trustworthy.

**Slot Operations Floor Person (On-call)**  
Providing excellent guest service to all slot guests and ensures that all gaming devices are monitored on a continual basis for full capacity operation. Will at times require the employee to work without direct supervision. Job knowledge and the ability to “self-start” are essential. Reports to the Slot Floor Manager or designer, ensure guest relations through prompt, and assists guests with slot machine usage, educating them regarding play, wagers, and pay tables.

**\*Willows Host (Full-time)**  
Provide an exceptional dining experience by delivering first class guest service by greeting and ensuring timely and appropriate seating of guests. Will assist Supervisor and/or Manager with table management to maximize seating and assist guests with special requests. Will answer phone calls and return messages, track reservations and comps and assist servers when needed.





FLY FISHING

A fly fisher two-steps to help Hill Country

It seems natural disasters, whether seen coming or suddenly appearing, can be, and usually are, horrific. I have been in, or seen, the end results of tornados, floods, and hurricanes, in Texas, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Colorado. The recent sudden flooding in the Hill Country of Texas, resulting in the loss of life and property, is unimaginable to those that have never seen something like this. Even for those that have seen disasters like this before, it is still heart- wrenching. Hopefully, you are asking yourself, “What can I do to help?” I have a two-step suggestion.

The Texas Hill Country is known for blue bonnets, Blue Bell ice cream, and great fly fishing. By my count, there are 14 rivers and numerous lakes to fly fish. I have floated and waded some of them multiple times. This flood has caused guide services, fly shops, motels, and restaurants to close. However, having seen previous disasters first-hand, I can tell you the people that have been knocked down by these events always, get back up. They will put their lives and businesses back together. It will be much easier with your help.

For step one: get your fly rod, a copy of Fly-Fishing the Texas Hill Coun-



try, a Guide to Fishing and Lodging on Texas Rivers by Kevin Hutchison, and head for the Hill Country of Texas. Once there you will have the opportunity to fly fish for bass, panfish, trout, carp, and maybe a gar. Since it is a long way to Texas, I suggest you book three or four days of guided fly fishing. Find a fly shop in the area, there are many, and buy fly fishing “stuff.” Eat and sleep at places above your normal budget level. Tip at a percentage level you consider excessive. All of those acts will help the local economy as it struggles to get back to normal. By the way, plan on doing this for two or three years. It will take that long for life in the Hill Country to get back to some type of normalcy.

Now, step two. For every day you fly fish, spend a day volunteering your time and talents helping the people affected by this natural disaster. Once the initial

surge of people using chain saws and front-end loaders passes there will be a need for lots of help, in all sorts of ways, for a long time. I’m not particularly handy, in fact, I have been forbidden from operating chain saws. So, some of the ways I have helped at other sites is to hold sheetrock as someone else nails it into place. I know pushing a broom as the mud dries in homes and businesses is helpful. Natural disasters have a way of destroying victims’ means of transportation. Use your car or truck to run errands for those needing it. Sometimes, just sitting quietly with someone who has lost everything near and dear to them is really helpful.

The opportunities are endless, just use your imagination. To find areas to volunteer stop at any local church. Also, you can check with a Chamber of Commerce or just pull up to a house or business where people are trying to get back to normal. You can be as creative in step two as you were in step one finding places to cast your fly.

Once you have completed steps one and two head to a local bar. Make sure there is a band playing country and western music. Now, spend the evening dancing a Texas two-step. You’ll really enjoy it after following my two step method for helping. I look forward to seeing you on the dance floor.

As summer rolls on, black bear sightings are on the rise—especially around the Cedar Point neighborhood. Even with a good natural food season, bears are still venturing into neighborhoods looking for easy meals.



Human Food = Bear Trouble

Feeding bears, even unintentionally, puts both the animals and our community at risk. Bears that get used to human food lose their natural fear of people and can become aggressive when food isn’t available.



Help Keep Bears Wild and Our Neighborhoods Safe:

- Store trash in bear-proof containers or keep it inside until pickup day.
  - **Tribal Members:** Contact Tribal Utilities at 970-563-5500 to upgrade to bear-proof trash cans for a small monthly fee.
- Bring pet food indoors at night.
- Take down bird feeders in the evening.
- Clean grills and store them inside.
- Pick ripe fruit and remove fallen fruit from the ground.



If You See a Bear:

- Stay calm.
- Back away slowly – do not run
- Avoid eye contact.
- Speak softly.
- If attacked, fight back.

FOR THE  
AGRICULTURAL COST-SHARE  
PROGRAM

The SUT Environmental Programs Department is now accepting applications for the Cost-Share Program (CSP). The purpose of the CSP is to work cooperatively with landowners to implement Best Management Practices (BMPs) on lands *within* the Reservation. BMPs are designed to improve local water quality, conserve agricultural lands, and protect wildlife habitat.

*The CSP pays 95% of the cost of selected BMPs and the participant provides 5% cost assistance via monetary or “in-kind” labor/materials.*

BMPs may include:

- Improved efficiency of on-site irrigation methods
- Development of off-stream livestock watering infrastructure
- Planting of vegetation buffers along fields and streams
- Installation of riparian livestock fencing

Due to limited funding, not all project applications may be approved. Projects are scored based on their potential to reduce agriculture related water pollution and improve water quality.

Applications are due August 25<sup>th</sup>, 2025
